WHEREAS, Mr. Holmes was the epitome of charm, wit and hospitality; his outgoing personality, sense of humor, infectious laugh, and spirit of true dedication to public service made him a beloved and respected figure throughout Surry County; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Holmes passing leaves a void that will be difficult to fill; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SURRY COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS that we honor the memory of Mr. Kenneth Holmes, former member of the Carsley District of the Surry County Board of Supervisors and express our condolences to the Holmes Family on his passing.

Obituary for Mr. Kenneth R. Holmes, Sr.

Our beloved Kenneth Ray Holmes, Sr. departed this life to be with the Lord while resting peacefully at his home on Tuesday, March 23, 2021. He was born to Isaac Holmes, Sr. and Fannie Holmes on May 27, 1949 in Surry County, Virginia and remained a resident and active member of his community until his death.

Kenneth attended the public schools in Surry County and graduated from L.P. Jackson High School in 1967. Ever passionate about higher education, he attended Virginia State (College) University and earned a Bachelor of Science in 1974. In his quest for more knowledge, he continued his matriculation at Virginia State to earn Master's degrees in 1975 and 1979. Kenneth also acquired certificates of Advanced Graduate Study in Vocational-Technical Education in 1983 from Virginia State University and in 1996 from Virginia Tech.

Eager to share the knowledge obtained, Kenneth devoted nearly 35 years to education and administration, lending his intellect and ingenuity to the public-school systems of Surry County, Richmond City, Petersburg City, and Chesterfield County. Kenneth also served as Director of Alumni Affairs at Virginia State University. Dedicated to public service and community action, he was a founding member of the Nu Delta Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. Kenneth also held numerous service and administrative positions including the Director of Alumni Affairs at Virginia State University, Member of the Improvement Association/Community Action, Member of the Board of Supervisors-Carsley District in Surry County, President of the Surry County African Heritage Society, as well as President of the Surry-Sussex-Prince George Alumni Chapter of Virginia State University.

Kenneth was also extremely innovative and used his inimitable way of seeing the world, to create the statewide Flunkbusters Campaign in 1985 to motivate students to excel academically. He also introduced the world to Busta Bookworm in 2008. This was yet another project established to inspire young people, by encouraging them to read.

An eclectic history buff, Kenneth surrounded himself with countless books, antiques, historical documents, artwork, and music. He was also a devoted and loving father who enjoyed spending quality time with his family and friends.

Kenneth was preceded in death by his father, mother, stepfather, Roosevelt Coleman; sister, Wilma H. Wyatt; brother, Anthony R. Wynn; foster brother, Ronald Alexander and former wife, Gwendolyn Vinson Holmes.

He leaves to cherish his memory two daughters; Keinya Holmes Clay (Andrew) of Bowie, MD; Khristi J. Holmes of Chesapeake; son, Kenneth R. Holmes, Jr. of Surry; grandson, Andrew (AJ) Clay, Jr.; sisters, Ernestine Spratley (Alvin), Judith Robinson, and Terry Dodson; brothers, M. Sherlock Holmes, Sr. (Doris), J. Russell Holmes (Gloria), Calvin Holmes (Rita), Isaac Holmes, Jr.; and a host of loving nieces, nephews, cousins, and friends.

Description of Presented Item: The County issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the performance of a general reassessment to become effective January 1, 2022. We received two proposals: Wingate Appraisal Services and Pearson's Appraisal Service. The Commissioner of Revenue and County Staff recommend that the Board authorize the county administrator to negotiate and execute a contract with Wingate Appraisal Services for the following reasons:

- 1) Familiarity with and demonstrated success in accurately assessing Surry's unique property mix
- 2) Inclusion of new construction assessments at no additional cost during reassessment period
- 3) Provision of a detailed schedule to meet the specific needs of this locality that will effectively produce the required results
- 4) Demonstrated high level of customer service and responsiveness
- 5) High recommendations from other Commissioners of Revenue

Wingate's proposed fee is \$30.45 per parcel and \$10.00 per manufactured home. The estimated total fee is \$197,508, based on 6,350 parcels and 415 manufactured homes. The ultimate fee may vary from this estimate based on the total number of parcels assessed.

The cost of the reassessment will be included in the FY2021-22 Proposed Budget.

Description of Presented Item: Agenda Note: Radio communications are crucial to the day-to-day operations of the Surry County Sheriff's Department, Emergency Fire and EMS, (Dispatch Communications, Rescue, and Volunteer Fire Departments) all stakeholders in this project. As such, we are looking for an experienced consulting firm that can conduct a thorough analysis and make recommendations for improving our radio system. Federal Engineering was selected based upon strong references from other communities in our local region and the scope of services that match the needs of the County. We are confident that FE's work will provide tremendous support as we prepare for potential upgrades/replacement of our public safety radio system which has been a long-standing need in the county,

BASIC SERVICE AGREEMENT

AGREEMENT made this 2nd day of April 2021 by and between Federal Engineering, Inc., a Maryland corporation, having offices at 10560 Arrowhead Drive, Suite 100, Fairfax, Virginia 22030, (hereinafter called "**FE**") and the County of Surry having offices at 45 School Street, Surry, VA 23883 (hereinafter called the "**Client**").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Client is awarding this contract cooperatively pursuant to Section 2.2-4304 of the Code of Virginia and in accordance with the terms of the Request for Proposals ("RFP") dated October 26, 2020, attached hereto and incorporated into this Agreement as Exhibit A, and the resulting contractual agreement, which includes **FE's** response to the RFP, dated January 7, 2021, between **FE** and the Twin County Regional 911 Commission ("Initial Contract"), attached hereto and incorporated into this Agreement as Exhibit B; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the Recital set forth above and good and valuable consideration set forth below, the parties hereto, intending to be legally bound, agree as follows:

1. **TERM:** The period of performance of this Agreement, for the purpose of issuing task orders hereunder, is from April 2, 2021 to December 31, 2023. This agreement may be extended by mutual agreement by both parties, in writing.

Subject to the provisions herein, **FE** shall in accordance with task orders issued hereunder, perform tasks in the general area of telecommunications, information technology, and management consulting services.

2. **STATEMENT OF WORK:** **FE** will complete the initial work as describe in its Statement of Work (SOW), *Project: SURRYCOVA: PSMR-RFP Public Safety Radio System Upgrade Request for Proposal*, dated April 2, 2021. The SOW is attached and made part of this Agreement as Exhibit C.

The **Client** may, from time to time, issue additional written Task Orders under this agreement which will specify: (a) the statement of work to be performed; (b) security requirements, if any; (c) ceiling price or amount of the order including all charges and travel authorizations, if any; and (d) any other applicable instructions. Said Task Orders will incorporate this agreement by reference. Where a conflict exists between the terms of any Task Order and the terms of this Agreement the terms of this Agreement shall control.

3. CLIENT OBLIGATIONS: Nothing herein shall be construed as an obligation of the Client to issue any additional tasks hereunder and the limit of the Client's duties shall extend only to the initial work and such additional task orders as it may issue. Additional task Orders, when issued, are subject to review and acceptance by **FE**, which shall accept by signing in the space so provided and returning a copy of the Task Order.

4. COMPENSATION: **FE** will be compensated in accordance with the terms and conditions as describe in its SOW, *Project: SURRYCOVA: PSMR-RFP Public Safety Radio System Upgrade Request for Proposal* dated April 2, 2021.

For any additional fixed price Task Orders, **FE** will submit invoices in accordance with the agreed upon milestone schedule showing the tasks that have been completed. For any additional time and materials Task Orders, **FE** will submit invoices in accordance with the rates and terms indicated in Exhibit C. Unless stated otherwise in any Task Order, payment of all invoices shall be due within thirty (30) days of the invoice date. Late balances are subject to a finance charge of 1.5 percent per month or fraction thereof. Any and all taxes, except income taxes, imposed or assessed by reason of this Agreement or its performance, including but not limited to sales or use taxes, will be in addition to the invoiced amounts and shall be paid by the Client.

5. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR: **FE** shall be deemed at all times to be an independent Contractor. Neither **FE** nor its personnel shall at any time, or for any purpose be considered employees or agents of the **Client**. **Client** is hereby contracting with **FE** for the services described in the Task Order and **FE** is not required to perform the services during a fixed hourly or daily time and if the services are performed at the **Client's** premises, then **FE's** time spent at the premises is to be at the discretion of **FE**; subject to the **Client's** normal business hours and security requirements. **FE** hereby confirms to the **Client** that the **Client** will not be required to furnish or provide any training to **FE** to enable **FE** to perform the services required hereunder. The services shall be performed by **FE** and the **Client** shall not be required to hire, supervise or pay any assistants to help **FE** perform the services under this Agreement. The management of the work, including but not limited to the order or sequence in which it is performed, shall be under the control of **FE** subject to compliance with the task order. Except to the extent that **FE's** work must be performed on or with **Client's** computer or **Client's** software, all materials used in providing the services shall be provided by **FE**. **FE** shall provide any insurance coverage that is required in the normal course of business as well as any specialized insurance that is specifically called for in this agreement. The **Client** understands and agrees that as an independent contractor, **FE** does not have any authority to sign contracts, notes, or obligations to make purchases, or to acquire or dispose of any property for or on the behalf of the **Client**.

6. WARRANTY: **FE** hereby warrants to the **Client** that **FE** is not under any obligation, contract, or agreement, nor has **FE** previously executed any documents whatsoever, with any person, firm, association, or corporation that would, in any manner, prevent **FE** from giving, and the **Client** from receiving, the full benefit of the **FE's** consulting services.

7. PROPRIETARY INFORMATION: **FE** hereby agrees that at all times both during the term of this Agreement and three (3) years after termination thereof, **FE** will hold inviolate and keep secret all knowledge, information, data, trade secrets, inventions, and customer lists that have been clearly marked "PROPRIETARY" by the **Client**. **FE** under the terms of this agreement will not disclose such information to any competitor, or other individual, corporation, or firm except when authorized to do so by the **Client**, in writing. Nothing herein shall be construed as to preclude **FE** in engaging in any occupation or endeavor which will not directly or indirectly involve the proprietary information of the **Client**.

FE's obligations with respect to handling and using proprietary information as set forth in this agreement are not applicable to: (1) Information that at the time of disclosure under this agreement is either known to **FE** or disclosed in existing literature or patents or is in any other way in the public domain; (2) Information that after disclosure under this agreement becomes known to **FE** by independent discovery or by casual observation or analysis of information provided by a third party; (3) Information that after disclosure under this agreement becomes known to **FE** from a source other than the **Client** without breach of any obligation by the disclosing party; (4) Information that is or has been furnished by the disclosing party to the Government with "unlimited" rights, and (5) Information available in the public domain

8. RELEASE OF INFORMATION: **FE** shall not make any public release of information in any medium concerning this agreement without prior review and approval by the **Client**. Requests for review of any materials proposed for public release in any medium shall be submitted in writing to an authorized representative of the **Client** for approval, which shall not be unduly withheld.

9. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE: This Agreement may be terminated by either party at any time, for any reason, by giving fifteen (15) days prior written notice of such termination to the other party. Should the **Client** terminate this agreement while work is in progress, **FE**, upon receipt of the notice shall stop all work as quickly as practical. 17. WAIVER: The failure of either party to insist on strict performance of any of the terms and conditions hereof shall not constitute a waiver of any other provisions.

18. FORCE MAJEURE: Neither party shall be responsible for failure to fulfill its obligations due to causes beyond its reasonable control, including without limitation, when such delay or failure is due solely to acts or omissions of government or military authority, acts of God, materials shortages, transportation delays, fires, floods, labor disturbances, riots, wars, terrorist acts or any other causes, directly or indirectly beyond the reasonable control of the non-performing party, so long as such party is using its best efforts to remedy such failure or delays.

C. RESPONSE TO SPECIFICATIONS/SCOPE OF SERVICES (RFP IX.C)

C.1 Project Management (RFP III.B.1)

FE recognizes the criticality of effective project management to the success of any project and to keeping all participants informed as to the status. Our team's adherence to the Project Management Institute (PMI) *Project Management Body of Knowledge* PMBOK agile methodologies facilitates timely completion of deliverables. *FE* will apply continuous project management principles to support the entire project lifecycle, completing each task to your satisfaction before initiating the next task. We tailor our project approach to fit the needs of our clients and design a custom solution that solves your unique challenges. Our project management methodology, applied with our public safety and technology experience, produces success on hundreds of projects each year, many of which are similar to this engagement.

FE will develop and maintain a detailed project plan from contract award through the presentation of the system alternatives and strategic roadmap within the agreed upon timeframe. *FE*'s project manager will coordinate activities with the RRITF's project manager, involve other stakeholders as needed, and serve as a primary resource to the Participating Jurisdictions. Project Understanding

Located in the southwestern region of Virginia in the Roanoke Valley and sprawling over 900 square miles, the Twin County Regional 9-1-1 Commission is made up of the Counties of Carroll and Grayson, the City of Galax, and the Towns of Hillsville and Independence. The region is economically challenged and has

mountainous terrain with a minimum elevation of 1,100 feet and a maximum elevation of 4,500 feet.

All agencies are dispatched from the primary Twin County 9-1-1 Center, located in Galax, which is connected to the Commonwealth's Comlinc. Key frequencies for all three Participating Jurisdictions are available through the Twin County 9-1-1 patch. This PSAP dispatches Fire and Rescue for the three jurisdictions, and there are two secondary law enforcement dispatch centers.

With grant assistance, the Participating Jurisdictions implemented a regional radio system in 2009. After implementation, it became the individual jurisdictions' responsibility to maintain equipment. Currently each agency has independent radio systems with similar architectures. All systems converge in the Communicator Centers. Additionally, frequencies are shared so that most portable radios contain both counties' frequencies. The Participating Jurisdictions have formed a Regional Radio Interoperability Task Force (RRITF) to achieve continuous regional cooperation and interoperability of public safety communication systems among multiple jurisdictions.

Most of the region is operating on conventional VHF equipment except for a few departments using Nexedge VHF systems operating independently. The Participating Jurisdiction's goal is to maintain or improve the current level of operability and interoperability which they have achieved through the existing communications infrastructure:

- Carroll County operates a VHF Analog System with one Nexedge Special Operations Channel, with a secondary law enforcement dispatch center that utilizes a Telex dispatch console. The county has two transmit/receive tower sites and seven receive sites. Each law enforcement car has a mobile repeater. Carroll County dispatches for Hillsdale Town, which has one radio site and a backup dispatch console at the Police Department.
- Grayson County operates a VHF analog/digital simulcast system with a secondary law enforcement dispatch center that utilizes a Moducom dispatch console. The county has five transmit/receive tower sites and one microwave-only site. Grayson County dispatches for Independence Town, which has one radio site at the Police Department.
- Galax City operates a VHF analog/P25 digital system in mixed mode with a dispatch center that utilizes an AVTEC dispatch console. The city has one primary transmit/receive tower site, three receive sites and one microwave-only site.

The RRITF is open to recommendations for a more regional approach where it improves communications and reduces costs while providing some autonomous systems or equipment that can be budgeted accordingly.

Federal Engineering will identify gaps and opportunities for system enhancement, develop strategic architecture, document specifications, and provide project management using *Project Management Body of Knowledge* (PMBOK) agile methodologies throughout all phases of this project. The various tasks provided in more detail below will lead to a conceptual new regional





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interoperable “system of systems” solution, outlined in a *Strategic Plan* for the RRITF and Commission decision makers by April 30, 2021.

FE will provide an independent assessment to inform decision-making on what would work best for the Twin County region. **FE** has not been involved in the previous regional system design, has no biases and is, therefore, in the best position to advise the RRITF and the Participating Jurisdictions.

Ability to Perform During COVID-19

FE will work with the RRITF project manager to adjust the project to meet shifting COVID-19 mandates. **FE** proposes this project with the effective ability to complete tasks during the COVID-19 pandemic. Although we prefer onsite meetings, our approach can shift to remote techniques to maintain the safety of our teams. C.2 Identify Gaps and Opportunities: Needs Assessment and Systems' Analysis (RFP 111.B.2)

Project Initiation Meeting

FE will conduct a project initiation meeting with the RRITF's project manager and designated officials from Participating Jurisdictions on a mutually agreed upon date following contract signing. This initial meeting will reaffirm a common understanding of the project goals, objectives, and vision, items best understood through a close working relationship between our respective management teams and staffs. It will be held onsite if current conditions allow us to meet safely, or if necessary, via conference call. Based on the outcome of the meeting, **FE** will deliver a project

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schedule that will serve as the guiding document throughout the project. We will also use this meeting as the first opportunity to establish the foundation for our ongoing relationship and develop a plan to maximize stakeholder engagement from Participating Jurisdictions.

Documentation Review and Fact Finding

Before meeting with stakeholders, we will request and review existing system documentation, including FCC licenses, radio shop records, site information, equipment and subscriber inventories, previous vendor recommendations, and other documents needed to assess the existing system. Performing a review of available documentation provides us with a common starting point and a foundation for understanding the status of the existing radio systems.

User Interviews and Data Gathering (RFP III.B.2.b)

Following the project initiation meeting, the *FE* team will conduct interviews with the Participating Jurisdictions to identify communications needs. This needs assessment task is one of the most important efforts because it establishes the foundation for systems analyses and during this assessment process, we accomplish the following:

- Identify and document current and future user needs
- Solicit users' perceptions of current system performance including gaps that do not meet their needs
- Educate users as to what is practical and affordable
- Begin to build consensus and "ownership" in the recommendations.

Our experts will schedule interviews with representatives from each of the Participating Jurisdictions' stakeholders designated by the RRITF's project manager.

To facilitate our interview process, we will prepare advance correspondence for the RRITF's project manager to review, then send to each participant to emphasize the need to be prepared and actively contribute to this process. Our project manager will develop a customized questionnaire that will form the basis for the interviews. The interview approach will generally follow the questionnaire but will also allow for additional areas of the interviewee's choice to be discussed. Functional, performance, and interoperability needs will all be addressed.

Early involvement encourages a broader understanding and participation by all stakeholders with the assurance that their issues are being addressed and incorporated into the overall design. Based upon hundreds of consortia, local, county, regional and state government projects, our technical experts have extensive experience in creating and facilitating this sense of unity and participation.

Clearly this program must "hit the mark" and deliver practical solutions that are affordable. The true "art" in this process is to develop high-level requirements that will be embraced by all users. *FE*'s methodology reflects our strong belief that the radio system infrastructure should be user driven, as opposed to technologically or politically driven, to best serve needs of law enforcement and firefighters. To achieve this goal, *FE* will carefully analyze the requirements of the relevant agencies to establish a baseline of system capabilities, functionality, and services. Based on this



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thorough needs and market assessment, we will identify potential “best-fit” solutions that satisfy the Participating Jurisdictions’ requirements.

FE will compile the user input and high-level requirements, identified through our needs assessment interviews, and include it in the *Strategic Plan Report*.

Site Surveys (RFP 111.B.2.a)

Leveraging our experience surveying thousands of radio sites across the country, our project team will review the status of each of the main radio sites. *FE* will review data and inventory records provided by each Participating Jurisdiction and information from their radio system service providers to develop an assessment of the condition and age of the existing systems’ infrastructure and equipment. We will conduct follow-up calls to confirm information, as required.

Our site surveyor will spend five days onsite visiting up to ten of the primary transmit/receive tower sites in Galax, Carroll County, and Grayson County, escorted by a designated staff person from each jurisdiction. We will rely on data provided by the Participating Jurisdictions for sites that we do not visit. During the tower site visits, our expert will confirm site coordinates including latitude, longitude, and elevation, and will collect information about the sites, typically including the following:

- Access road and general site conditions
- Perimeter security
- Equipment shelter and available space
- HVAC
- Antennas and mounts and available space
- Nearby obstructions
- Service history and ownership
- Availability of surrounding land
- Transmission line support structure
- Waveguide and dry air systems
- AC, DC, solar power
- Emergency power
- Radio and microwave electronics
- Grounding/variances from standards

Our site surveyor will assess the site and equipment for functionality and future viability to support additional or new equipment based on visual observation, then document any site deficiencies and status of existing system equipment, network infrastructure, and site facilities. As part of this analysis, our experts will identify any components of the existing system that could be retained in an upgraded system. *FE* will document site survey findings for inclusion in the final *Strategic Plan Report*.

Model Existing System Coverage (RFP 111.B.2.c)

Radio coverage is the single most important characteristic of a public safety radio network. A radio network is of little value if the users cannot access it due to unreliable coverage. Recognizing this years ago, Federal Engineering made major investments and developed *FEPerformancePro™*, a powerful toolset used to accurately model radio network performance.

FEPerformancePro™ is based upon the ICS Telecom software engine used by the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD), FCC, NTIA, and APCO for radio network analysis. Its accuracy has been confirmed by the U.S. Federal Government and validated for clients through drive testing by *FE* and numerous network implementations. *FEPerformancePro™* includes the following network analysis tools:





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- FECoverage™ - complete coverage analysis tool
- FEMapper™ - high-resolution mapping tool
- FENetCap™ - network capacity analysis tool
- FEMitigate™ - system-wide interference analysis tool (optional)
- FETeamCoverage™ - interactive user coverage workshop

Our coverage expert will work with the RRITF's project manager to determine how coverage plots should be depicted, including color schemes, topology, roads, patrol zones, and other characteristics unique to the Participating Jurisdictions. He will then load the existing transmitter locations and other relevant information into the FECoverage™ model and generate coverage maps of coverage from the existing systems using FEMapper™. As shown later in this section, maps will include mobile and portable coverage areas, noting both talk-out and talk-in, with indoor and outdoor coverage areas defined. This will serve as the baseline to begin assessing radio system upgrade alternatives.

C.3 Develop Strategic Architecture: Alternatives Analysis and Conceptual Design (RFP 111.B.3)

The RFP requests one or more proposed system detailed architectures for the replacement of the three current, interoperable communication systems, based on jurisdictions' financial challenges. *FE* will conduct a high-level analysis of three alternatives: a new integrated regionwide VHF system architecture and two alternatives based on individual system upgrades for each of the three Participating Jurisdictions interoperating as a regional system. Our project plan is based on a high-level coverage analysis of these alternatives, followed by a comprehensive analysis of the pros and cons of the two most feasible alternatives that best meet the RRITF's stated needs.

Analysis of Alternatives: FETeamCoverage™ Workshop (RFP 111.B.2.g)

To begin the strategic architecture assessment, we will use FETeamCoverage™, an innovative approach to network design that involves RRITF personnel in the process.

FE will schedule an interactive coverage workshop to be delivered via the internet. This real-time session allows participants to immediately see the coverage anticipated with system changes or upgrades for each of the three Participating Jurisdictions. In the process, we will incorporate knowledge about existing systems and sites and reported coverage issues, targeting those areas where gaps have been identified.

FE pioneered the concept of a coverage workshop over a decade ago. Our coverage expert has delivered the FETeamCoverage™ experience to numerous clients, the majority with coverage and terrain issues similar to the Participating Jurisdictions. Our interactive coverage methodology has set the standard and we were recently invited by IWCE to deliver a real-time workshop, highlighting the effectiveness of our FETeamCoverage™ workshop in modeling both LMR and LTE coverage parameters.

FE Team Coverage™ Workshop Topics

- System users' coverage needs
- Coverage problem areas identified
- Areas where traditional tower-based coverage is not possible
- Leveraging existing sites and new sites to fill coverage gaps





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As radio coverage is modeled and gaps are indicated, our subject matter expert will interactively, and in real-time, manipulate the model and display the effects of changing site equipment, placing additional sites in the network, and the impact of spectrum decisions. Workshop attendees will immediately be able to evaluate the impact of these changes and determine what is needed to meet user requirements. The FETeamCoverage™ experience will build consensus and facilitate "buy-in" of the eventual system solution. Our project plan assumes FETeamCoverage™ will be presented via the internet. As an option, it can be presented on site.

Our coverage analysis will yield coverage maps as image files that can be viewed using Word or a PDF viewer. The raw data can be manipulated either in a GIS program (such as ArcGIS) or Google Earth application. We can provide coverage footprints in Google Earth format (KML or KMZ files) to make viewing coverage interactive, allowing clients to zoom in to street and building level. Exhibit 2 below provides examples of the types of maps we can create with FECoverage™ and FEMapper.

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


Exhibit 2—Sample Coverage Maps





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Alternatives Analyses—Configuration, Capacity, Spectrum, Dispatch Support, Interoperability

At the conclusion of the coverage workshop, we will discuss findings with the participants and select the two most feasible alternatives for more detailed analysis. Our propagation experts will provide insights for users about key segments of the two most feasible alternatives, from infrastructure to radio dispatch systems to end user subscriber equipment. As an independent, vendor-neutral firm, the RRITF can be certain that we are only interested in solutions that meet your unique needs.

We will identify tower sites, equipment architecture, and maps for the two alternatives and then analyze the pros and cons of configurations, capacity, licensing, regulatory compliance, backhaul, and interoperability in addressing user requirements:

- System Configuration Analysis—**FE** will analyze system architectures including conventional versus simulcast, trunked and encrypted functionality for each alternative, compared to user requirements and the capabilities of existing technology. The analysis will indicate each alternative's ability to interface with the existing AVTEC, Moducom, and Telex dispatch consoles, voice recording systems, and COMLINC system.
- Capacity Analysis—**FE** will use current and future requirements as discussed in the interviews to assess the expected traffic load of the systems. Our analysis will evaluate projected future capacity needs and capabilities, as well as review the current topography that may influence the RRITF's selection of a new regional strategic architecture. Using FENetCap™, our staff will analyze the distribution of available frequencies among the radio sites, establishing a viable frequency and channel plan that meets capacity requirements.
- Spectrum Availability/FCC Impacts Analysis—Based on the alternatives, we will evaluate frequencies and availability to determine licensing impacts and any risks. We will evaluate VHF spectrum licensed to the jurisdictions and determine if existing licenses can be modified to accommodate additional sites, and if license modifications are necessary. We will research availability of new frequencies, as required.
- Tower Site Development Regulatory Issues Analysis – **FE** will identify potential regulatory issues, including requirements for filing a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) *Notice of Proposed Construction or Alteration* (Form 7460-1) to register proposed new towers for FAA compliance. We will also identify issues that may necessitate completion of an Environmental Impact Statement or Cultural Resources Assessment for State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) compliance.
- Backhaul Analysis—**FE** will model potential microwave backhaul network connectivity for each alternative using FENetwork™.
- Interoperability Analysis—**FE** will assess interoperability among designated system users and with neighboring counties, state, and federal agencies. For the alternatives under consideration, we will evaluate the impact each would have on the operations of system users. We will explore the possibilities for enhanced interoperability among the Participating Jurisdictions and with neighboring public safety entities and leverage any existing regional infrastructure.



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- Sustainability Strategy—*FE* will assess requirements and develop a maintenance strategy for sustaining the existing systems supported by each jurisdiction until cutover to the new regional system. We will include requirements for decommissioning the existing systems in specifications for the system vendors.

Designing Networks to Withstand Local Environmental Challenges

Fault Tolerant Networks

FE understands that first responders rely heavily upon their radio networks, especially in times of local or widespread emergencies. Our network designs and specifications stress that vendors must provide fault tolerant networks. We define fault tolerance as no single point of failure within the system can take down the network and the loss of any control component must not reduce system functionality. We also require that vendor-proposed systems provide automatic activation of failure modes in the event of a failure beyond a single point and that the activation of failure modes cannot interrupt ongoing wide-area or local communication.

Site Hardening

FE's site hardening recommendations protect our clients' mission-critical communications systems from natural and manmade disasters. Incorporating industry standards including ANSI, IEEE, NEMA, NFPA, and UL publications, our site hardening requirements address physical plant security, antenna support structures, equipment enclosures, environmental/climate control systems, utilities, and backup power systems along with carrier equipment hardening.

Site hardening requirements vary greatly based on the geographic location of a system, threat assessments, and budgets. Therefore, we incorporate site hardening requirements that are client specific.

In addition, *FE* appreciates the operational needs during extreme events and takes them into account so that the system designs are sufficient to support emergency operations. For example, we know that systems must support mutual aid communications with other first responders coming to render aid for communities impacted by severe weather events as well as public service departments that provide bus transportation and other forms of evacuation.



Cost Analysis of Alternatives (RFP 111.B.3.h)

FE will prepare high-level budgetary cost estimates using FECostPro™ our in-house cost analysis tool for the regional radio system alternatives, including network management system, mutual aid systems, microwave network, subscriber units, site support equipment, implementation services, and ongoing maintenance. The FECostPro™ cost estimates will be based on the following:

- Data collected from previous projects
- Our knowledge of the Commonwealth, similar counties across Virginia, and publicly available industry information



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- Information collected specifically for the RRITF's project
- *FE*'s experience designing comparable radio systems across the nation

FE's budgetary estimates are intentionally conservative. Typically, vendor proposal pricing is unlikely to exceed *FE*'s estimate, based on a comparable design as outlined in our assumptions. Our cost estimates are based upon recent non-discounted pricing. Frequently, system vendors provide discounts for large system and subscriber unit purchases; however, dynamics in the competitive systems market make it impractical to forecast the specific discounts vendors may offer at the time of proposal submission. Actual system costs are highly dependent upon final system design choices as well as conditions in the land mobile and microwave radio markets during the system procurement phase.

C.4 Strategic Plan Report and Presentation

We will prepare a draft *Strategic Plan Report*, describing our needs assessment, high-level system requirements, tower site visits and existing system findings, coverage modeling, and alternatives analysis with advantages and disadvantages of each alternative. The *Strategic Plan* will include recommendations for the strategic architecture, including suggested tower locations, spectrum, coverage maps, and estimated costs. Clients have said that *FE* reports are the best in the industry. We communicate complicated technical system information in a balanced presentation for both technical and non-technical audiences.

We will present the results of our analysis to the RRITF during an onsite review meeting, assuming current COVID-19 restrictions allow, or if necessary, during a conference call. We will review the conceptual alternatives, present our findings and recommendations, and lead discussion for decision makers to identify their preferred alternative that best meets the Participating Jurisdictions needs. We will provide five days for the RRITF's review and comment. We will then revise the report and issue the final *Twin County Regional 9-1-1 Commission Strategic Plan Report*.

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C.5 Document System Specifications (RFP 111.B.4)

Finalize Conceptual Design

The nature of the next steps may vary greatly depending on the solution and approach selected by the RRITF. Following acceptance of the strategic architecture recommended in the *Strategic Plan Report*, *FE* will finalize the conceptual design and its sites/locations.

Develop Technical Specifications and Request for Proposal

FE will develop one set of technical specifications for the RRITF's selected solution. Specifications will describe the solution's functional and performance requirements in sufficient detail for vendors to submit consistent proposals, will be verifiable through future acceptance testing, and will stress the use of existing investments wherever possible to minimize costs. The "detailed design" of the system will be left to the radio system vendor to promote a competitive environment, allow for innovative approaches, and cause the vendor to remain responsible for system performance in accordance with the specifications. These specifications will be the foundation for vendor proposal evaluation and as acceptance criteria.

Our well-crafted technical specifications and procurement documents include requirements for smooth system cutover, while accommodating the unique needs of each system user and decommissioning of existing systems.

FE's functional/performance specifications approach has been proven over billions of dollars in procurements. Our approach avoids the pitfalls of an approach in which the consultant develops detailed design specifications. This obsolete approach inherently shifts the burden of risk from the vendor to the Participating Jurisdictions since the vendor is no longer required to meet the region's functional and performance needs but rather just delivers a design. Even the Federal Government, which has used detailed design specifications for decades, is moving away from them and embracing the same approach proposed by *FE*.

FE typically includes the following in our specifications for each of the systems to be procured under a single procurement document:

- Functional, protocol, and operational requirements
- Regulatory and standards compliance
- Leverage existing resources
- Infrastructure equipment
- Suggested site locations and development
- Site subsystems (e.g. power and HVAC)

C.6 Optional Services

Frequency Application (Optional)





Project Description

Dinwiddie County sought the services of a qualified Public Safety Communications System Consultant to provide an analysis and review of the current radio system and its elements, make recommendations, and provide direction for the County-wide Public Safety radio system that will, eventually, be fully interoperable in the region.

The County required a public safety radio system to fully cover the varying topography of the region. The system shall be interoperable during emergencies with the public safety agencies in surrounding localities, to include Amelia, Chesterfield, City of Petersburg, Prince George, Sussex, and Brunswick. These localities currently operate public safety radio systems in multiple areas of the radio spectrum including VHF, UHF, and 700/800 MHz. A collaborative expanded system consisting of neighboring systems was explored, as well as a stand-alone system. The system also needs to provide alerting for Fire/EMS stations and volunteer Fire/EMS personnel. *FE* evaluated the existing system and provided the most practicable and best solution and options for Dinwiddie County.

Project Description

The FE team worked with Floyd County to complete an assessment and upgrade of their public safety communications system. We completed data gathering and user interviews to identify current and projected communications needs. Following the interviews, the team spent time visiting the dispatch center and conducting physical site surveys of the two remote transmitter sites and one repeater site.

As required, we analyzed three alternatives: a collaborative system expansion of neighboring systems, both the Montgomery County and Roanoke County systems, and a stand-alone new Floyd County public safety communications system. Our project plan is based on a comprehensive analysis of the pros and cons of these three alternatives. FE's coverage SME held a coverage workshop to model the conceptual design and coverage of the three alternatives.

Pittsylvania County needed to upgrade its radio communications system to a countywide interoperable P25 system leveraging existing VHF frequencies, sites, and infrastructure. In addition, the county needed to meet the FCC narrowbanding mandate for VHF frequency licenses. 


Exhibit 3—Federal Engineering's Corporate Structure








Exhibit 4—Project Organization Chart

BASIC SERVICE AGREEMENT FOR VIRGINIA JURISDICTIONS

AGREEMENT made this _____ day of _____ 20____ by and between Federal Engineering, Inc., a Maryland corporation, having offices at 10560 Arrowhead Drive, Suite 100, Fairfax, Virginia 22030, (hereinafter called "**FE**") and _____ (hereinafter called the "**Client**").

The period of performance of this Agreement, for the purpose of issuing task orders hereunder, is from _____ to _____. This agreement may be extended by mutual agreement by both parties, in writing.

Subject to the provisions herein, **FE** shall in accordance with task orders issued hereunder, perform tasks in the general area of telecommunications, information technology, and management consulting services.

1. STATEMENT OF WORK: The **Client** may, from time to time, issue written Task Orders under this agreement which will specify: (a) the statement of work to be performed; (b) security requirements, if any; (c) ceiling price or amount of the order including all charges and travel authorizations, if any; and (d) any other applicable instructions. Said Task Orders will incorporate this agreement by reference. Where a conflict exists between the terms of any Task Order and the terms of this Agreement the terms of this Agreement shall control.

2. CLIENT OBLIGATIONS: Nothing herein shall be construed as an obligation of the **Client** to issue any tasks hereunder and the limit of the **Client's** duties shall extend only to such task orders as it may issue. Task Orders, when issued, are subject to review and acceptance by **FE**, which shall accept by signing in the space so provided and returning a copy of the Task Order.

3. COMPENSATION: For fixed price Task Orders, **FE** will submit invoices in accordance with the agreed upon milestone schedule showing the tasks that have been completed. For time and materials Task Orders, **FE** will submit invoices in accordance with the rates and terms indicated in Schedules [INSERT] attached hereto and made part of this Agreement indicating the number of days or hours worked and an itemized breakdown of other costs incurred. Unless stated otherwise in any Task Order, payment of all invoices shall be due within thirty (30) days of the invoice date. Late balances are subject to a finance charge of 1.5 percent per month or fraction thereof. Any and all taxes, except income taxes, imposed or assessed by reason of this Agreement or its performance, including but not limited to sales or use taxes, will be in addition to the invoiced amounts and shall be paid by the Client.

4. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR: **FE** shall be deemed at all times to be an independent Contractor. Neither **FE** nor its personnel shall at any time, or for any purpose be considered employees or agents of the **Client**. **Client** is hereby contracting with **FE** for the services described in the Task Order and **FE** is not required to perform the services during a fixed hourly or daily time and if the services are performed at the **Client's** premises, then **FE's** time spent at the premises is to be at the discretion of **FE**; subject to the **Client's** normal business hours and security requirements. **FE** hereby confirms to the **Client** that the **Client**

will not be required to furnish or provide any training to **FE** to enable **FE** to perform the services required hereunder. In no event shall **FE** be liable for special or consequential damages, either in contract or tort, whether or not the possibility of such damages has been disclosed to **FE** in advance or could have been reasonably foreseen by **FE**, and in the event this limitation of damages is held unenforceable, then the parties agree that by reason of the difficulty in foreseeing possible damages, all liability to **Client** shall be limited to One Hundred dollars (\$100.00) as liquidated damages and not as a penalty.

6. **PROPRIETARY INFORMATION:** **FE** hereby agrees that at all times both during the term of this Agreement and three (3) years after termination thereof, **FE** will hold inviolate and keep secret all knowledge, information, data, trade secrets, inventions, and customer lists that have been clearly marked "PROPRIETARY" by the **Client**. **FE** under the terms of this agreement will not disclose such information to any competitor, or other individual, corporation, or firm except when authorized to do so by the **Client**, in writing. Nothing herein shall be construed as to preclude **FE** in engaging in any occupation or endeavor which will not directly or indirectly involve the proprietary information of the **Client**.

FE's obligations with respect to handling and using proprietary information as set forth in this agreement are not applicable to: (1) Information that at the time of disclosure under this agreement is either known to **FE** or disclosed in existing literature or patents or is in any other way in the public domain; (2) Information that after disclosure under this agreement becomes known to **FE** by independent discovery or by casual observation or analysis of information provided by a third party; (3) Information that after disclosure under this agreement becomes known to **FE** from a source other than the **Client** without breach of any obligation by the disclosing party; (4) Information that is or has been furnished by the disclosing party to the Government with "unlimited" rights, and (5) Information available in the public domain

7. **RELEASE OF INFORMATION:** **FE** shall not make any public release of information in any medium concerning this agreement without prior review and approval by the **Client**. Requests for review of any materials proposed for public

release in any medium shall be submitted in writing to an authorized representative of the **Client** for approval, which shall not be unduly withheld.

8. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE: This Agreement may be terminated by either party at any time, for any reason, by giving written notice of such termination to the other party. Should the **Client** terminate this agreement while work is in progress, **FE**, upon receipt of the notice shall stop all work as quickly as practical. The **Client** shall be responsible for all labor and expenses incurred by **FE** up until work actually terminates.

9. ASSIGNMENT: Neither party shall assign or transfer this Agreement without written consent of the other party.

10. GOVERNING LAW: This agreement shall be interpreted and the rights of the parties shall be determined under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The **Client** hereby agrees to pay all legal, court, and collection fees incurred by **FE** to collect any overdue invoices rendered to the **Client**. The **Client** agrees that the venue for any and all disputes shall be in the courts of Fairfax County, Virginia.

11. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS: **FE** agrees to comply with all applicable laws, statutes, and orders of the United States Government and any State or political subdivisions thereof now in effect or hereafter enacted, and the same shall be deemed to be incorporated by reference. **FE** shall be held harmless by the **Client** for violation of any governmental procurement regulation to which it may be subject but to which specific written reference is not made in this agreement.

12. SET OFF: The **Client** agrees that **FE** shall have the right to set off, against any amounts which may become due and payable to the **Client**, any amount which the **Client** may owe to **FE**, whether arising under this Agreement or otherwise.

13. HOLD HARMLESS: The **Client** shall indemnify and save **FE** harmless from any losses, claims, demands, suits, judgments, or out-of-pocket expenses incurred as a result of any damage or injury to or claim by the **Client**, its employees, agents, or property, or for any injury or damage to or claim (including claims of patent or copyright infringement) by any third persons or their property which is directly or indirectly caused in the course of performance of any of the work specified in this agreement. Further, the **Client** shall indemnify and compensate **FE** for any time **FE**, its employees, personnel, agents, consultants, or attorneys spend as a result of any claim, suit, or judgment by a third party arising directly or indirectly out of the work specified in this Agreement.

14. NON-SOLICITATION: **Client** hereby agrees that for the term of this Agreement, and for a period of one (1) year thereafter, that the **Client** shall not directly or indirectly, orally, in writing, or by other method of communication, solicit any employee, agent, or consultant of **FE**, nor encourage any employee, agent, or consultant to terminate his or her employment or relationship with **FE**. **Client** further agrees that for the term of this Agreement, and for a period of one (1) year thereafter, should the **Client** hire any employee, agent, or consultant of **FE**, that **FE** is entitled to a finder's fee equal to seventy percent (70%) of the employee, agent, or consultant's first year total compensation package.

15. WAIVER: The failure of **FE** to insist on strict performance of any of the terms and conditions hereof shall not constitute a waiver of any other provisions.

16. **FORCE MAJEURE:** Neither party shall be responsible for failure to fulfill its obligations due to causes beyond its reasonable control, including without limitation, acts or omissions of government or military authority, acts of God, materials shortages, transportation delays, fires, floods, labor disturbances, riots, wars, terrorist acts or any other causes, directly or indirectly beyond the reasonable control of the non-performing party, so long as such party is using its best efforts to remedy such failure or delays.

17. **ATTORNEYS FEES:** If the **Client** should breach any term, condition or obligation created by this Agreement, then **FE** shall be entitled to be reimbursed for all of its reasonable attorneys' fees, court costs, litigation fees, transcript costs, deposition costs, and other related litigation and non-litigation costs incurred by **FE**.

18. **CONSTRUCTION:** Paragraph numbers and headings are for convenience only and shall not affect the interpretation of this agreement. If any term or condition of this Agreement is in conflict with local, state, or federal law and becomes null and void, the remainder of the Agreement shall survive and remain in effect. If the scope of any of the provisions of the Agreement is too broad in any respect whatsoever to permit enforcement to its full extent, then such provisions shall be enforced to the maximum extent permitted by law, and the parties hereto consent and agree that such scope may be judicially modified accordingly and that the whole of such provisions of this agreement shall not thereby fail, but that the scope of such provisions shall be curtailed only to the extent necessary to conform to law. 20. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT:** This Agreement supersedes all previous agreements both oral and in writing and contains all the terms and conditions of this transaction. All modifications to this agreement must be reduced to writing as amendments and duly executed by both parties hereto

BASIC SERVICE AGREEMENT

AGREEMENT made this 7th day of January 2021 by and between Federal Engineering, Inc., a Maryland corporation, having offices at 10560 Arrowhead Drive, Suite 100, Fairfax, Virginia 22030, (hereinafter called "**FE**") and the Twin County Regional 911 Commission having offices at 353 North Main Street, Galax, VA 24333 (hereinafter called the "**Client**").

The period of performance of this Agreement, for the purpose of issuing task orders hereunder, is from January 7, 2021 to December 31, 2022. This agreement may be extended by mutual agreement by both parties, in writing.

Subject to the provisions herein, **FE** shall in accordance with task orders issued hereunder, perform tasks in the general area of telecommunications, information technology, and management consulting services.

1. **STATEMENT OF WORK:** **FE** will complete the initial work as described in its *Proposal named Twin County LMR Strategic Plan* dated December 10, 2020 (the "Proposal") in response to the Client's RFP named Consulting Services for Strategic Plan for New Radio Communication Systems for The Counties of Carroll, Grayson, the City of Galax, the Towns of Hillsville and Independence dated October 26, 2020 and as amended via Q&A dated December 2, 2020 and December 3, 2020 (collectively, the "RFP"). The foregoing documents are attached and made part of this agreement. The statement of work described in the Proposal is hereby modified to add cursory visits to 7 additional radio sites. The Client and **FE** will schedule the project so all 17 sites can be visited in one week. The rest of the Proposal remains unchanged.

The **Client** may, from time to time, issue additional written Task Orders under this agreement which will specify: (a) the statement of work to be performed; (b) security requirements, if any; (c) ceiling price or amount of the order including all charges and travel authorizations, if any; and (d) any other applicable instructions. Said Task Orders will incorporate this agreement by reference. Where a conflict exists between the terms of any Task Order and the terms of this Agreement the terms of this Agreement shall control.

2. **CLIENT OBLIGATIONS:** Nothing herein shall be construed as an obligation of the **Client** to issue any additional tasks hereunder and the limit of the **Client's** duties shall extend only to the initial work and such additional task orders as it may issue. Additional task Orders, when issued, are subject to review and acceptance by **FE**, which shall accept by signing in the space so provided and returning a copy of the Task Order.

3. **COMPENSATION:** **FE** will be compensated in accordance with the terms and conditions as described in its Proposal.

For any additional fixed price Task Orders, **FE** will submit invoices in accordance with the agreed upon milestone schedule showing the tasks that have been completed. For any additional time and materials Task Orders, **FE** will submit invoices in accordance with the rates and terms indicated in Schedules A of its proposal. Unless stated otherwise in any Task Order, payment of all invoices shall be due within thirty (30) days of the invoice date. Late balances are subject to a finance charge of 1.5 percent per month or fraction thereof. Any and all taxes, except income taxes, imposed or assessed by reason of this Agreement or its performance, including but not limited to sales or use taxes, will be in addition to the invoiced amounts and shall be paid by the Client. The parties anticipate that the services provided to **Client** will be exempt from state and local taxes by virtue of **Client's** status as a tax-exempt governmental entity of the Commonwealth of Virginia. **Client** will provide verification of status, including exempt ID number upon request.

4. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR: **FE** shall be deemed at all times to be an independent Contractor. Neither **FE** nor its personnel shall at any time, or for any purpose be considered employees or agents of the **Client**. **Client** is hereby contracting with **FE** for the services described in the Task Order and **FE** is not required to perform the services during a fixed hourly or daily time and if the services are performed at the **Client's** premises, then **FE's** time spent at the premises is to be at the discretion of **FE**; subject to the **Client's** normal business hours and security requirements. **FE** hereby confirms to the **Client** that the **Client** will not be required to furnish or provide any training to **FE** to enable **FE** to perform the services required hereunder. The services shall be performed by **FE** and the **Client** shall not be required to hire, supervise or pay any assistants to help **FE** perform the services under this Agreement. The management of the work, including but not limited to the order or sequence in which it is performed, shall be under the control of **FE** subject to compliance with the task order. Except to the extent that **FE's** work must be performed on or with **Client's** computer or **Client's** software, all materials used in providing the services shall be provided by **FE**. **FE** shall provide any insurance coverage that is required in the normal course of business as well as any specialized insurance that is specifically called for in this agreement. The **Client** understands and agrees that as an independent contractor, **FE** does not have any authority to sign contracts, notes, or obligations to make purchases, or to acquire or dispose of any property for or on the behalf of the **Client**.

5. WARRANTY: **FE** hereby warrants to the **Client** that the firm is not under any obligation, contract, or agreement, nor has the firm previously executed any documents whatsoever, with any person, firm, association, or corporation that would, in any manner, prevent **FE** from giving, and the **Client** from receiving, the full benefit of the firm's consulting services. In no event shall **FE's** liability to **Client** exceed the total fees paid by **Client** to **FE** pursuant to this Agreement.

6. PROPRIETARY INFORMATION: **FE** hereby agrees that at all times both during the term of this Agreement and three (3) years after termination thereof, **FE** will hold inviolate and keep secret all knowledge, information, data, trade secrets, inventions,

and customer lists that have been clearly marked "PROPRIETARY" by the **Client**. **FE** under the terms of this agreement will not disclose such information to any competitor, or other individual, corporation, or firm except when authorized to do so by the **Client**, in writing. Nothing herein shall be construed as to preclude **FE** in engaging in any occupation or endeavor which will not directly or indirectly involve the proprietary information of the **Client**.

FE's obligations with respect to handling and using proprietary information as set forth in this agreement are not applicable to: (1) Information that at the time of disclosure under this agreement is either known to **FE** or disclosed in existing literature or patents or is in any other way in the public domain; (2) Information that after disclosure under this agreement becomes known to **FE** by independent discovery or by casual observation or analysis of information provided by a third party; (3) Information that after disclosure under this agreement becomes known to **FE** from a source other than the **Client** without breach of any obligation by the disclosing party; (4) Information that is or has been furnished by the disclosing party to the Government with "unlimited" rights, and (5) Information available in the public domain

7. RELEASE OF INFORMATION: **FE** shall not make any public release of information in any medium concerning this agreement without prior review and approval by the **Client**. Requests for review of any materials proposed for public release in any medium shall be submitted in writing to an authorized representative of the **Client** for approval, which shall not be unduly withheld.

8. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE: This Agreement may be terminated by either party at any time, for any reason, by giving written notice of such termination to the other party. Should **FE** terminate this Agreement, the written notice shall be delivered at least 30 days in advance of termination. Should the **Client** terminate this agreement while work is in progress, **FE**, upon receipt of the notice shall stop all work as quickly as practical. The **Client** shall be responsible for all labor and expenses incurred by **FE** up until work actually terminates.

9. ASSIGNMENT: Neither party shall assign or transfer this Agreement without written consent of the other party.

10. GOVERNING LAW: This agreement shall be interpreted and the rights of the parties shall be determined under the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. The **Client** agrees that the venue for any and all disputes shall be in the circuit courts of Carroll County and Grayson County, Virginia.

11. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS: **FE** agrees to comply with all applicable laws, statutes, and orders of the United States Government and any State or political subdivisions thereof now in effect or hereafter enacted, and the same shall be deemed to be incorporated by reference.

12. SUPPLEMENTAL TERMS / PROCUREMENT ACT COMPLIANCE. This Agreement shall be governed by the Supplemental Terms attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference.

13. COOPERATIVE PROCUREMENT: Pursuant to Virginia Code Section § 2.2-4304 "Cooperative Procurement", any resultant contract of this solicitation may be extended to any public agency or body in the Commonwealth of Virginia to permit those public agencies or bodies to purchase at contract prices, in accordance with the terms, conditions and specifications of this solicitation. The successful contractor shall deal directly with each public agency or body in regard to order placement, delivery, invoicing and payment.

14. NON-SOLICITATION: **Client** hereby agrees that for the term of this Agreement, and for a period of one (1) year thereafter, that the **Client** shall not directly or indirectly, orally, in writing, or by other method of communication, solicit any employee, agent, or consultant of **FE**, nor encourage any employee, agent, or consultant to terminate his or her employment or relationship with **FE**. **Client** further agrees that for the term of this Agreement, and for a period of one (1) year thereafter, should the **Client** hire any employee, agent, or consultant of **FE**, that **FE** is entitled to all equitable and legal remedies available under the law.

15. WAIVER: The failure of either party to insist on strict performance of any of the terms and conditions hereof shall not constitute a waiver of any other provisions.

16. FORCE MAJEURE: Neither party shall be responsible for failure to fulfill its obligations due to causes beyond its reasonable control, including without limitation, acts or omissions of government or military authority, acts of God, materials shortages, transportation delays, fires, floods, labor disturbances, riots, wars, terrorist acts or any other causes, directly or indirectly beyond the reasonable control of the non-performing party, so long as such party is using its best efforts to remedy such failure or delays.

17. ATTORNEYS FEES: If either party should breach any term, condition or obligation created by this Agreement, then the non-breaching party shall be entitled to be reimbursed for all of its reasonable attorneys' fees, court costs, litigation fees, transcript costs, deposition costs, and other related litigation and non-litigation costs incurred.

18. CONSTRUCTION: Paragraph numbers and headings are for convenience only and shall not affect the interpretation of this agreement. If any term or condition of this Agreement is in conflict with local, state, or federal law and becomes null and void, the remainder of the Agreement shall survive and remain in effect. If the scope of any of the provisions of the Agreement is too broad in any respect whatsoever to permit enforcement to its full extent, then such provisions shall be enforced to the maximum extent permitted by law, and the parties hereto consent and agree that such scope may be judicially modified accordingly and that the whole of such provisions of this agreement shall not thereby fail, but that the scope of such provisions shall be curtailed

only to the extent necessary to conform to law. This Agreement shall be construed as having been negotiated between the parties and not drafted by a particular party.

19. ENTIRE AGREEMENT: This Agreement supersedes all previous agreements both oral and in writing and contains all the terms and conditions of this transaction. All modifications to this agreement must be reduced to writing as amendments and duly executed by both parties hereto.

20. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Agreement shall become effective when executed by both parties and shall be binding upon the parties hereto, their successors and permitted assigns.



EXHIBIT A: SUPPLEMENTAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. General Provisions

Nothing in any resulting contract shall be construed as authority for either party to make commitments which will bind the other party beyond the scope of service contained herein. This contract is subject to appropriations by the Client.

2. Laws of the Commonwealth

A. FE represents to the Client that it will:

1. Conform to the provisions of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, the Virginia Fair Employment Contracting Act of 1975, as amended, and the Virginia Human Rights Act, as amended, where applicable;
2. Not employ illegal alien workers or otherwise violate the provisions of the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986;
3. Comply with federal, state and local laws and regulations applicable to the performance of the services procured; and
4. Has submitted the bid or proposal in full compliance with the Virginia Conflict of Interest Act.

B. In every contract of over \$10,000, FE agrees during the performance of this contract that:

1. FE (1) will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, status as a service-disabled veteran, national origin or other status prohibited by state law, (2) will post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause, and (3) will state that FE is an equal opportunity employer in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of FE under this contract. All notices, advertisements, and solicitations placed in accordance with federal law, rule or regulation shall be deemed sufficient for the purpose of meeting the requirements of this section; and

C. In every contract of over \$10,000, FE agrees during the performance of this contract that:

FE shall A) provide a drug-free workplace for its employees; B) post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, a

statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance or marijuana is prohibited in its workplace and specify the actions which will be taken against any employee for a violation; C) state in all of its solicitations or advertisements for employees that it maintains a drug-free workplace; and D) include the provisions of this sub-paragraph in every subcontract or purchase order of over \$10,000, so that said provisions shall be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor.

For purposes of this sub-paragraph, "drug-free workplace" means a site for the performance of work done in connection with a specific contract awarded to a FE in accordance with the provisions of the Virginia Public Procurement Act, the employees of whom are prohibited from engaging in the unlawful manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of any controlled substance or marijuana during the performance of the contract.

- D. In addition to the provisions contained in sub-paragraph C. pertaining to drug-free place, FE shall comply with the Federal Drug Free Workplace Act.
- E. Pursuant to Section 2.2-4343.1 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, in all invitations to bid, requests for proposals, contracts, and purchase orders, the Client does not discriminate against faith-based organizations.

"Faith-based Organization" means a religious organization that is or applies to be a FE to provide goods or services for programs funded by the block grant provided pursuant to the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, P.L. 104-193.

If FE is a faith-based organization, then FE shall give to each individual who applies for or receives goods, services, or disbursements provided pursuant to this Agreement the following notice:

NOTICE

Pursuant to Section 2.2-4343.1 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as an applicant for or recipient of goods, services, or disbursements provided pursuant to a contract between the Client and a faith-based organization, you are hereby notified as follows:

Neither the Client's selection of a charitable or faith-based provider of services nor the expenditure of funds under this contract is an endorsement of the provider's charitable or religious character, practices, or expression. No provider of services may discriminate against you on the basis of religion, a religious belief, or

your refusal to actively participate in a religious practice. If you object to a particular provider because of its religious character, you may request assignment to a different provider. If you believe that your rights have been violated, please discuss the complaint with your provider or notify the Client's designated representative.

3. Certifications

FE certifies that:

- A. The bid or offer (1) is made without prior participation, understanding, agreement, or connection with any corporation, firm or person submitting a bid/offer for the same materials, supplies, equipment, or services with respect to the allocation of the business afforded by or resulting from the acceptance of the bid or proposal, (2) is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and (3) is or is intended to be competitive and free from any collusion with any person, firm or corporation;
- B. FE has not offered or received any kickback from any other bidder or FE, supplier, manufacturer, or subcontractor in connection with the bid/offer on this solicitation. A kickback is defined as an inducement for the award of a contract, subcontracts or order, in the form of any payment, loan, subscription, advance, deposit of money, services or anything, present or promised, unless consideration of substantially equal or greater value is exchanged. Further, no person shall demand or receive any payment, loan, subscription, advance, and deposit of money, services or anything of value in return for an agreement not to compete on a public contract;
- C. FE is not a party to nor has he participated in nor is obligated or otherwise bound by agreement, arrangement or other understanding with any person, firm or corporation relating to the exchange of information concerning bids, prices, terms or condition upon which the contract resulting from the acceptance of his bid proposal is to be performed;
- D. FE understands that collusive bidding is a violation of the Virginia Governmental Frauds Act and federal Law, and can result in fines, prison sentences, and civil damage awards and agrees to abide by all conditions of this proposal; and
- E. FE or subcontractor has not and will not confer on any public employee having official responsibility for a procurement transaction any payment, loan, subscription, advance, deposit of money, services or anything of more than nominal value, present or promised, unless consideration of substantially equal or greater value is exchanged.

4. Modifications, Additions or Changes

Modifications, additions or changes to these terms and conditions may not be made except in writing and agreed to by the Client; however, no fixed priced contract may be increased by more than twenty-five (25) percent of the amount of the contract or \$50,000 whichever is greater without the approval of the Client. The amount of any contract may not be increased for any purpose without adequate consideration provided to the Client.

5. Assignment

The contract may not be assigned, sublet, or transferred without the written consent of the Client.

6. Documents

Copies of any and all reports, studies, photographs, negatives, or other documents prepared by FE in the performance of its obligations under any resulting contract shall be remitted to the Client by FE upon completion, termination or cancellation of this Contract.

7. Liability Coverage

Each party shall take out and maintain during the life of the Contract such bodily injury, liability and property damage liability insurance as shall protect it from claims for damages for personal injury, including death, as well as from claims for property damage, which may arise from its activities under this agreement. FE shall additionally maintain any coverage required by law, including worker's compensation coverage as applicable. FE shall provide the Client upon request with a certificate of insurance showing such insurance to be in force.

8. Severability

If any provision of this Contract is held to be illegal, invalid, or unenforceable, or is found to be against public policy for any reasons, such provision shall be fully severable and this Contract shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal, invalid, or unenforceable provision had never been part of this Contract, and the remaining provisions of this Contract shall remain in full force and effect and shall not be affected by the illegal, invalid, or unenforceable provision, or by its severance from this Contract.

9. Limitation of Liability

The Contract is subject to annual appropriation by the governing body Client. Neither the Contract nor any amount due or to become due under the Contract shall be deemed to constitute a debt or pledge of the faith and credit of the Commonwealth of Virginia or any political subdivision thereof. Neither the Commonwealth of Virginia nor any political subdivision thereof shall be obligated to pay any amount due or to become due under this Contract except from funds annually appropriated by the governing body of Client for such purpose.

10. Contractual Claims Procedure

- A. Contractual claims or disputes by FE, whether for money or other relief, except for claims or disputes exempted by law from the procedure set forth herein, shall be submitted in writing no later than sixty (60) days after the event giving rise to such claim; provided, however, that FE shall give the Client written notice of its intention to file a claim or dispute within fifteen (15) days after the occurrence upon which the claim or dispute shall be based. Any written notice of FE's intention to file such a claim or dispute need not detail the amount of the claim, but shall state the facts and/or issues relating to the claim in sufficient detail to identify the claim, together with its character and scope. Whether or not FE files such written notice, FE shall proceed with the work as directed. If FE fails to make its claim or dispute, or fails to give notice of its intention to do so as provided herein, then such claim or dispute shall be deemed forfeited.
- B. The Client, upon receipt of a detailed claim, may at any time render its decision and shall render such decision within one hundred twenty (120) days of final payment. Each such decision rendered shall be forwarded to FE by written notice.
- C. If FE disagrees with the decision of the Client concerning any pending claim, FE shall promptly notify the Client by written notice that FE is proceeding with the work under protest. Any claim not resolved, whether by failure of FE to accept the decision of the Client or under a written notice of FE's intention to file a claim or a detailed claim not acted upon by the governing body of the Client, shall be specifically exempt by FE from payment request, whether progress or final. Pendency of claims shall not delay payment of amounts agreed due in the final payment.
- C. The decision on contractual claims by the governing body of the Client shall be final and conclusive unless FE appeals within six months of the date of the final decision on the claim by instituting legal action in the appropriate circuit court.

OF HILLSVILLE AND INDEPENDENCE

I. INTRODUCTION:

- A. The intent and purpose of this Request for Proposal (RFP) and resulting contract(s) is to obtain consulting services from a qualified firm to audit the current radio system(s), develop recommendations for a new regional system design taking advantage of new technologies, and provide a phased plan for procurement and implementation of the new Radio Communication Systems for the counties of Carroll and Grayson, the City of Galax. The Towns of Hillsdale and Independence will require limited services as noted below. The communication systems are hereinafter referred to as "the new regional radio system" and the jurisdictions named are hereinafter referred to as the "Participating Jurisdictions".
- B. This procurement is conducted by the City of Galax pursuant to Virginia Code §2.2-4304 for Cooperative Procurement.
- C. The Twin County 9-1-1 Regional Commission is issuing this RFP on behalf of the Participating Jurisdictions.

II. BACKGROUND:

- A. The Participating Jurisdictions cover approximately 900 square miles of mountainous terrain in an economically challenged area of southwest Virginia.
- B. The Participating Jurisdictions implemented a Regional Radio system in 2009 with grant funding. After implementation, it became individual jurisdictions' responsibility to maintain equipment located within their jurisdiction. Galax and Carroll Law Enforcement have subsequently updated their equipment to digital and Nexedge solutions, respectively. Much of the Fire and Rescue equipment is aging out. Individual agencies are beginning to pursue independent solutions.

C. The Participating Jurisdictions have formed a Regional Radio Interoperability Task Force (RRITF) in order to ensure continuous regional cooperation and interoperability of public safety communication systems among multiple jurisdictions.

D. The RRITF will serve as the Selection Committee, which will select one or the firms (the "Successful Offeror") as a result of this RFP. Following negotiations with the firm selected, the Selection Committee will recommend award of a contract by City of Galax.

III. SCOPE OF SERVICES:

A. The Successful Offeror shall provide all personnel, equipment and materials to perform all services necessary to complete the project in a professional manner. The Successful Offeror shall give the best possible consultation, advice and service to the Participating Jurisdictions during the performance of the project in accordance with the highest standards in the communications consulting industry.

B. The services listed below are intended to be examples of the minimum required tasks. Offerors shall address their ability to provide each of these services in their proposal response. Offerors are also encouraged to include any additional services necessary to complete the project.

1. Project Management

- a) *Develop and maintain as the overall Project Manager both regional and individual jurisdictional detailed project plans from award of this consultant contract to the presentation of the system alternatives and strategic roadmap within agreed timeframe.*
- b) *Provide quality assurance on all project deliverables and recommend corrective actions.*

2. Identify Gaps and Opportunities

- a) *Visit tower sites to confirm and assess assets.*
- b) *Meet with key stakeholders to confirm assets and to identify operational issues, technology concerns and future expectations.*
- c) *Develop propagation based on current environment.*

3. Develop Strategic Architecture
 - a) *Based on jurisdictions' financial challenges, develop one or more proposed system detailed architectures for the replacement of the current communication systems. The architecture should include tower sites, equipment architecture by tower, agency/vehicle, and field units.*
 - b) *The solution should provide a single regional solution with three separate but interoperable systems which meet the needs of the Participating Jurisdictions while maintaining the existing or enhanced levels of interoperability.*
 - c) *The solution should interface with existing Dispatch consoles, voice recording systems, and COMLINC system.*
 - d) *Provide Federal Communications Commission (FCC) licensing impacts and any risks.*
 - e) *Provide regulatory issues tied to tower site development such as environmental and historic compliance and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) compliance.*
 - f) *Provide and develop a sustainability strategy regarding the maintenance and decommissioning of existing systems currently supported by each jurisdiction.*
 - g) *Provide comparative propagation for the proposed architecture(s).*
 - h) *Provide reasonable order of magnitude pricing by jurisdiction and phase.*
4. Document System Specifications
 - a) *Begin Initial Regulatory Process*
 - b) *Prepare Technical Specifications*
 - c) *Develop Functional Requirements*
 - d) *Develop Performance Requirements*
 - e) *Develop Preliminary Purchase Documents and Forms*

IV. GENERAL QUALIFICATIONS OF THE OFFERORS:

- A. Offerors must demonstrate their firms overall specific experience and capabilities in Regional Radio Network design, planning, estimating, solicitation development, vendor selection, negotiations and award, system installation, project management, etc. on projects of similar size, scope and complexity.
- A. Offerors must demonstrate their firm's ability to finish projects within specified times, within a specified budget, and with minimal change orders.

B. Offerors must identify the proposed project team members and qualifications including but not limited to their credentials, work experience and amount of time anticipated for commitment to each locality throughout the all phases of work concurrently.

C. Offerors must demonstrate financial stability by providing the most recent audited financial statements.

D. Offerors must provide an overview of the firm with an organizational chart of your proposed team to include any proposed sub-consultants.

E. Offerors must address the firm's current work load and ability to undertake a project of this size and scope.

F. Offeror shall disclose affiliations including 'reseller' designations with radio equipment suppliers.

V. CURRENT SYSTEM DESCRIPTIONS:

A. It is the Participating Jurisdiction's intent to maintain or improve the current level of operability and interoperability.

B. The region's law enforcement, public safety, emergency communications and public service personnel are currently utilizing VHF technologies further detailed below:

Carroll County

Carroll County operates a VHF Analog System with one Nexedge Special Operations Channel.

Carroll County has 2 transmit/receive tower sites and 7 receive sites.

- Beamer's Knob County Tower – transmitters and receivers for fire, rescue and law; voters for rescue and law; antennas and microwave links.
- Fisher's Peak - transmitters and receivers for fire, rescue and law; antennas and microwave links.
- Ward's Knob radio station tower – receivers, antennas and microwave links
- Route 100 Water Tower - receivers, antennas and microwave links
- Laurel Fork Fire Tower - receivers, antennas and microwave links

- Indian Ridge - receivers, antennas and microwave links
- Laurel Rescue (Exist 19) - receivers, antennas and microwave links
- Pops Peak – receiver for Sheriff's and EMS; antennas and microwave links
- County Complex – receiver for Law only

Carroll County has one secondary law enforcement dispatch center located at the Sheriff's Office at 605 Pine Street Hillsdale VA. The dispatch center has 3 local operator positions and utilizes a Telex dispatch console. Each law enforcement car has a mobile repeater.

Carroll County frequencies/channels:

Law – Carroll has one (1) primary frequency. and one Special Operations Channel (6.25 channel spacing ultra narrow band)

Fire – Three (3) volunteer Fire Departments with individual frequencies/channels. In addition to the primary channel, each Fire Department has a non-repeated work channel.

EMS – One (1) paid and three (3) volunteer EMS agencies using one shared frequency/channel.

There are approximately 275 portable radios, 100 mobile radios, 45 mobile repeaters, 15 control stations et al affiliated with the system.

Hillsdale Town

Hillsdale has one site at Hillsdale Police Department.

Carroll County dispatches for Hillsdale, However, Hillsdale PD houses a back-up dispatch console.

Independence Town

Independence has one site at Independence Police Department.

Grayson County dispatches for Independence Police Department.

Grayson County

The System is comprised of x simulcast transmit/receive sites. Tower locations are:

- Point Look-out – Antennas/repeaters and Microwave

- Mount Rogers – Antennas/repeaters
- Rugby – York Ridge (Sheriff's Office Wired Road site) (F&R standalone) Antennas/Repeaters
- Wards Knob – Antennas/Repeaters, Microwave
- Fries (U.S. Cellular site in Old Town) – Antennas/Repeaters, Microwave
- Independence – Wolf Knob - Microwave

Grayson County has one secondary law enforcement dispatch center. The dispatch center has 2 local operator positions, and utilizes a Moducom dispatch console.

Grayson County frequencies/channels:

Law – One (1) primary analog frequency, One (1) digital channel, One (1) Low band channel

Fire & EMS – One (1) paid and three (2) volunteer EMS agencies; two (2) Fire agencies, and four (4) volunteer fire/rescue agencies using one shared frequency/channel.

There are approximately 32 portable radios, 30 mobile radios/control stations et al affiliated with the Sheriff's office system. There approximately 250 portable radios, 60 mobiles for Fire and Rescue.

Galax City

The System is comprised of 1 primary tower site. Tower locations are:

- Wards Knob - Primary– Galax Police (P-25 and Analog) repeaters, Galax Fire (2 analog repeaters – moving to Nexedge), Galax-Grayson EMS repeater, and CityWide (P-25 and Analog) repeaters, 1 multi-channel radio with Interop channels controlled by dispatch. ALL radios for Regional dispatch are also located at site with microwave control from dispatch AVTEC console
- TCRH – Galax Public Works Repeater, 1 backup radio programmed with all Galax, Carroll, Grayson channels for dispatch use connected via microwave to AVTEC dispatch console
- Galax PD – Microwave connection to Wards Knob, Galax PD, Galax Fire and Galax-Grayson EMS radios connected to Sytech Rios COMLINC system.
- Fishers Peak – Galax Fire has a receiver which is connected via UHF link to Wards Knob voter

Galax has one dispatch center and dispatches for Galax PD, Fire and Rescue for all Participating Jurisdictions.. The dispatch center has 4 local operator positions, and utilizes a AVTEC dispatch console.

Galax City frequencies/channels:

Law – One (1) P-25 digital and one (1) analog VHF frequency pair, running in Mixed Mode.

CityWide – Backup/Event channel for city agencies. One (1) P-25 digital and one (1) analog VHF frequency pair, running in Mixed Mode.

Fire – One volunteer agency utilizing a VHF repeated channel (analog but moving to NEXEDGE). Additional VHF analog “Work” repeated channel.

EMS – One (1) paid EMS agency using one VHF Analog repeated channel.

There are approximately 100 portable radios, 65 mobile radios/control stations et al affiliated with the system.

VI. JURISDICTIONAL RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

A. Each participating jurisdiction will designate an individual(s) to act as the jurisdiction's representative with respect to the work to be performed under this contract. Such individual shall have the authority to transmit instructions, receive information, and interpret and define the jurisdiction's policies and decisions with respect to the contract.

B. Each jurisdiction shall provide resources and information which relates to the jurisdiction's requirements for the project to the Successful Offeror upon request and as agreed in the project plan.

VIII. PROPOSAL SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

- A. Proposals must be delivered to Jolena Young, 911 Regional Coordinator c/o Twin County 9-1-1 Regional Commission at 353 N Main Street, Galax, VA or by email at jyoung@galaxva.com before the date/time specified in the Anticipated Schedule.
- B. The 911 Coordinator will not accept oral proposals, nor proposals received by telephone or FAX machine.
- C. All erasures, interpolations, and other changes in the proposal shall be signed or initialed by the Offeror.
- D. A Proposal Signature Sheet must accompany any proposal(s) submitted and be signed by an authorized representative of the Offeror. If the Offeror is a firm or corporation, the Offeror must print the name and title of the individual executing the proposal. All information requested should be submitted. Failure to submit all information requested may result in the 911 Coordinator requiring prompt submission of missing information and/or giving a lowered evaluation of the proposal.
- E. The time proposals are received shall be determined by the time on the email, or the time on the 911 Coordinator's computer upon receipt by Offeror or courier.
- F. By submitting a proposal in response to this Request for Proposal, the Offeror represents it has read and understand the Scope of Services and has familiarized itself with all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, and rules and regulations that in any manner may affect the cost, progress, or performance of the Contract work.
- G. The failure or omission of any Offeror to receive or examine any form, instrument, addendum, or other documents or to acquaint itself with conditions existing at the site, shall in no way relieve any Offeror from any obligations with respect to its proposal or to the Contract.

H. Trade secrets or proprietary information submitted by an Offeror in response to this Request for Proposal shall not be subject to public disclosure under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act; however, the Offeror must invoke the protection of this section prior to or upon submission of data or materials, and must identify the data or other materials to be protected and state the reasons why protection is necessary (Va. Code § 2.2-4342.F). (Attachment A)

I. A proposal may be modified or withdrawn by the Offeror any time prior to the time and date set for the receipt of proposals. The Offeror shall notify the 911 Coordinator in writing of its intentions.

J. If a change in the proposal is requested, the modification must be so worded by the Offeror as to not reveal the original amount of the proposal.

K. Modified and withdrawn proposals may be resubmitted to the 911 Coordinator up to the time and date set for the receipt of proposals.

L. No proposal can be withdrawn after the time set for the receipt of proposals and for one-hundred twenty (120) days thereafter.

M. The Participating Jurisdictions welcomes comments regarding how the proposal documents, scope of services, or drawings may be improved. Offerors requesting clarification, interpretation of, or improvements to the proposal general terms, conditions, scope of services or drawings shall make a written request which shall reach the 911 Coordinator no later than November 13, 2020. Any changes to the proposal shall be in the form of a written addendum issued by the RRITF no later than November 20, 2020. Each Offeror is responsible for determining that it has received all addenda issued by the RRITF before submitting a proposal.

N. All proposals received in the 911 Coordinator's office on time shall be accepted. All late proposals received by the 911 Coordinator shall be returned to the Offeror unopened. Proposals shall be open to public inspection only after award of the Contract.

IX. PROPOSAL RESPONSE FORMAT:

The Offeror should include in its proposal as a minimum the following:

- C. Response to Specifications - Offerors shall address each section of the Scope of Services. The Offeror shall identify any exceptions, referenced to the paragraph number, in a subsection titled "Exceptions".
- D. References - Offerors shall provide a list of at least three (3) references with which you have completed projects of similar size and scope. Local government references are preferred. Use format below for references:
 - 1. Name Company Address

 - 4. Contact Email Address
 - 5. Contract Award Date
 - 6. Contract Value
- E. Project approach, implementation project plan and responsibilities of jurisdictions. Offerors shall provide a narrative that describes the firm's approach for providing the required services.
- F. Pricing - For initial evaluation purposes, Offerors shall provide not to exceed pricing for this phase of the project along with fully loaded and all-inclusive hourly rates for all proposed team members. The RFP shall specify the payment schedule not to exceed 3 payments with a minimum of 10% billed following acceptance of the final deliverable.
- G. Contract Terms – Offerors should provide a draft copy of the engagement contract.
- H. Appendices - Optional. Offerors may wish to submit additional materials that will clarify their response to the RFP.

X. PROPOSAL EVALUATION/SELECTION PROCESS:

A. Selection of the Successful Offeror will be based upon submission of proposals meeting the selection criteria. The selection criteria will include:

The Selection Committee shall then conduct negotiations with the Offeror. Price shall be considered, but need not be the sole determining factor. The award document will be a contract incorporating by reference all the requirements, terms and conditions of the solicitation and the Offeror's proposal as negotiated.

PROJECT: SURRYCOVA: PSMR-RFP PUBLIC SAFETY RADIO SYSTEM UPGRADE REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL

1. INTRODUCTION AND ISSUES

Surry County (County) is seeking to contract with Federal Engineering, Inc. (**FE**) to assist them with drafting a Request for Proposals (RFP) to replace their mission critical public safety wireless land mobile radio communications system. In September of 2019, the County received a report done by another consulting firm recommending they procure and implement a new 700/800 MHz 4 channel TDMA simulcast system.

This statement of work represents the next phase of the project. **FE** will conduct a validation exercise with county stakeholders to affirm the findings of the previous report. Upon validation, **FE** will then develop an RFP consisting of functional and performance requirements described in sufficient detail for proposers to submit comprehensive proposals and assist the County through the procurement process.

NOTE: To minimize costs, **FE** will leverage the work done by the previous consultant to the extent possible and appropriate.

2. PROJECT TASKS

2.1 Project Initiation and System Requirements

FE will prepare and submit a Request for Information (RFI) to the County for additional system and user documentation and review the materials received. We will then conduct a project initiation meeting with the County's project manager and designated stakeholders on a mutually agreed upon date following contract signing. This initial meeting will reaffirm a common understanding of the project goals, objectives, and vision; items best understood through a close working relationship between our respective management teams and staffs. It will be held onsite if current conditions allow us to meet safely, or if necessary, via conference call.

FE's requirements discovery and documentation methodology places considerable emphasis on accurately determining the needs of the system owners and system users, for the County, and participating agencies. At this point in the project, considering the 18-month gap since the prior needs assessment report, County system stakeholders will benefit from review and of the high-level near- and long-term requirements outlined in the previous report and the detailed system performance metrics needed for RFP development. **FE** will review requirements with the County during an on-site briefing immediately following the Project Initiation meeting. This allows the **FE** team and the County to gain consensus, acceptance, and a mutual understanding of the requirements before RFP drafting begins.

Deliverable: Project Schedule and System Requirements

FE will deliver a project schedule that will serve as the guiding document throughout the project and a high-level list of system performance requirements for the new land mobile radio communications system.

2.2 Coverage Analysis

FE will schedule an interactive coverage workshop to be delivered via the internet. This real-time session allows participants to immediately see the coverage anticipated with system changes or upgrades. In the process, we will incorporate knowledge about existing systems and sites and reported coverage issues, targeting those areas where gaps have been identified.

As radio coverage is modeled and gaps are indicated, our subject matter expert will interactively, and in real-time, manipulate the model and display the effects of changing site equipment, placing additional sites in the network, and the impact of spectrum decisions. Workshop attendees will immediately be able to evaluate the impact of these changes and determine what is needed to meet user requirements. The **FETeamCoverage™** experience will build consensus and facilitate “buy-in” of the eventual system solution.

Deliverable: Coverage Maps and Baseline Data

FE will document preferred system site locations to be communicated in the RFP to the vendors and provide the County conceptual system design coverage maps consistent with what the County should expect to see in the vendor responses.

2.3 Proposal Requirements

FE will generate the Proposal Requirements section of the system RFP which will provide a project overview and include instructions for proposers, including, but not limited to:

- Proposal format
- Proposal content
 - Company and staff experience
 - Description of similar projects
 - Proposed system design details
 - Project management plan

- System implementation and migration plans
- Warranty, maintenance, and support
- System, subscriber, and support costs
- Procurement process

Deliverable: Draft Proposal Requirements

FE will review the Draft Proposal Requirements section with the County project team via conference call and then prepare and deliver the Final Proposal Requirements section based on review comments from the County project team.

2.4 Functional Specifications

FE will generate the Functional Specifications section of the system RFP which will include the functional and performance requirements for the design, construction and testing of the new countywide wireless land mobile radio system, described in sufficient detail for proposers to submit comprehensive proposals. The Functional Specifications section will also be the foundation for vendor proposal evaluation, and will include, but not be limited to the following:

- System functional and operational requirements
- Potential sites and connectivity based on the conceptual design
- System reliability and redundancy
- Radio vendor deliverable requirements (i.e. design package, FCC license documents, operations and maintenance manuals, test plans and reports, and training manuals)
- Regulatory and standards compliance
- Environmental, seismic, and other site requirements
- Migration and cutover plans
- System coverage and acceptance test plans
- Network management
- Training
- Warranty

Deliverable: Draft Functional Specifications

FE will review the Draft Functional Specifications section with the County project team via conference call and then prepare and deliver the Final Functional Specifications section based on review comments from the County project team.

2.5 RFP PACKAGE

After the County has incorporated the above sections and completed the RFP package, **FE** will review it to assist with identifying and resolving conflicting information.

2.6 Procurement Support

Upon issuance of the RFP, **FE** will attend and participate, as needed, in the vendor pre-bid meeting via teleconference and provide responses to all technical questions received by the County and assist with any RFP addenda.

FE will also assist the County by providing the following procurement support activities:

- Develop an RFP vendor compliance matrix
- Develop scoring evaluation criteria
- Evaluate up to three vendor proposals
- Prepare a vendor proposals evaluation workbook
- Attend a proposal review meeting and vendor presentations
- Provide SME support via conference call to County vendor selection committee
- Attend final vendor selection meeting via conference call

2.7 Contract Negotiations

After County notification of award to the selected vendor, **FE** will provide the County with experienced contract negotiations support. The proposed project team has considerable experience negotiating public safety radio systems, equipment, and services, with a proven track record of saving our clients' money and shifting project risk to the vendor. In preparation for the negotiations, we will re-evaluate the selected proposal in detail, looking for specific items that could impact the final contract, such as the following:

- Extra equipment or software that is not necessary to optimize the system
- Open-ended or vague statements
- Inadequate vendor program management and/or quality assurance
- Unclear or not measurable performance specifications
- Site and acceptance testing that are not representative of true system performance or do not provide adequate test coverage
- Coverage and subsystem infrastructure acceptance terms
- Adherence to good workmanship standards
- Payment schedules that favor the vendor such as payments on shipment rather than on receipt and acceptance
- Anything that causes acceptance before testing is complete
- "Beneficial Use" statements not appropriate to the system
- Items that can be split out of the contract and done by the County for a substantially lower cost
- Parts list errors

FE will assist in negotiating the contract using the RFP's Functional specifications, the County's Procurement Policy, and the terms and conditions as a starting point.

3. STAFFING/ORGANIZATION

FE's staff for this project will be:

- Brad Barber, Project Management Director, will provide project oversight and guidance to the **FE** project team

- David TerMorshuizen, Project Manager, will be the day-to-day interface with the County and **FE** team and is responsible for project deliverables, schedule, and communication

THREE VIRGINIA COMMUNITIES RECOGNIZED WITH COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AWARDS (CEDA) BY STATE ASSOCIATION

Hampton Roads, Virginia — **The Virginia Economic Developers Association (VEDA)** is pleased to announce it has selected its 2021 Community Economic Development Awards (CEDA) recipients, recognizing **James City County** and the **City of Williamsburg** for their efforts in advancing economic vitality during the COVID-19 pandemic.

VEDA recognized **Surry County** with an honorable mention award for the expansion of broadband internet for residents and businesses in the community.

Award recipients were recognized during the VEDA 2021 Spring Conference on March 19.

Entries are judged on factors that include innovativeness, transferability, community commitment, and the benefits derived for each.

VEDA will submit the two winning entries to the Southern Economic Development Council (SEDC) for consideration at its similar award program that will take place later this year. Last year, Pittsylvania County, Danville and the Southern Virginia Regional Alliance went on to win the SEDC award among the southern states for its planning efforts to regain jobs and investment in that region.

“The challenges facing Virginia’s economic development organizations were unprecedented in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic,” said Jenny Carter, Director of Workforce Partnerships and Projects at the Virginia Community College System and chair of VEDA’s CEDA awards committee. “All of our awards recipients shifted gears quickly on behalf of their communities to keep their local economies moving in the right direction.”

James City County partnered with the Greater Williamsburg Partnership, Williamsburg Community Foundation and the Virginia 30 Day Fund to be the first locality partnership offering \$3,000 grants to businesses based in the County through the Virginia 30 Day Fund. More than 125 businesses received grants in a little over six months, and each business received the funding quickly. Businesses included local restaurants, retail, small manufacturers, consumer and professional services, a lavender farm and a hotel. The program was effective and proved to be easily replicated in locations and even other emergency situations. The program supported business retention particularly to small, locally-owned businesses with 30 or fewer employees.



The **City of Williamsburg** issued six \$1.3 million in grants through six different programs to existing businesses to help them weather the pandemic. The Williamsburg Department of Economic Development set up virtual office hours to support businesses with problem-solving the challenges of the pandemic. In addition, the Department supported efforts to expand outdoor dining on Duke of Gloucester Street, an effort that restaurant owners lauded as a "game changer," due to Gov. Northam's restrictions on indoor seating.



Surry County and Prince George Electric Cooperative's subsidiary, RURALBAND, received a \$2.25 million grant from the Virginia Telecommunications Initiative to extend services to areas underserved by a broadband provider.

By Feb. 2021, RURALBAND had connected 637 County residents to high-speed internet and set up multiple hot spots in the community to serve as hot spots available to all community members.

The portion of the Project proposed within Surry County would consist of approximately 193 MW of the solar energy facility within 24 parcels with an estimated total of 4,328 acres. Of the 4,328 acres in Surry County, approximately 3,314 acres would be purchased or leased for the Project (Project Area), and the Project facilities would cover approximately 1,341 acres of land (Project Site). The Project will utilize photovoltaic (PV) modules installed on single-axis trackers. Electricity will be delivered from electrical inverters adjacent to the PV modules, via transmission lines that will run from the Project to the nearby Septa Substation owned by Dominion Energy.

The Public Hearings will be to consider applications for the following:

Comprehensive Plan Map Amendment No. 2021-01

The Applicant, Cavalier Solar A, LLC, seeks a map amendment to the Development Plan Map of the Surry County Comprehensive Plan to reflect that the property is suitable for General Industrial use. The project consists of 24 parcels which are zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight.

Rezoning Application No. 2021-01

The Applicant, Cavalier Solar A, LLC, seeks to rezone \pm 4,328 acres from Agricultural Rural District (A-R) to General Industrial District (M-1) to permit a solar utility use. The project consists of 24 parcels which are zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight County.

Conditional Use Permit No. 2021-01

The Applicant, Cavalier Solar A, LLC, seeks a conditional use permit for a solar generation facility in Surry County. The project consists of 24 parcels which are zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight County.

The proposed CUP includes conditions to mitigate any adverse effects of the proposed facility to the affected parcels and immediately adjacent parcels as well as facility decommissioning.

Substantially in Accord Determination

Pursuant to Virginia Code Section 15.2-2232(A), Applicant Cavalier Solar A, LLC seeks a determination that the Project, as defined in Conditional Use Permit Application No. 2020-04, is substantially in accord with the Surry County Comprehensive Plan for the proposal to construct and operate a solar energy facility. The project consists of 24 parcels which are zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight County.

Required Action: Authorize Public Hearing for April 1, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. or shortly thereafter.

SOLAR FACILITY SITING AGREEMENT

This Solar Facility Siting Agreement (“Agreement”), dated as of _____ (the “Effective Date”), is by and between Surry County, Virginia, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia (the “County”) and Cavalier Solar A, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company (“Applicant”). The County and Applicant are herein each a “Party” and collectively, the “Parties”.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Applicant intends to develop, install, build, and operate a ground-mounted solar photovoltaic electric generating facility (“Project”) on certain parcel(s) of land identified as Surry County Tax Map Parcels 53-3B, 53-3F, 53-4, 53-5, 53-6, 59-31, 60-1-1, 60-12, 60-17, 60-20, 60-21, 60-9, 61-1, 61-1-4, 61-1-5, 61-2, 61-2-1, 61-2-2, 61-2-3, 61-2-4, 61-2-5, 61-3, 61-4, 61-5 (collectively, the “Property”);

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Chapter 22, Title 15.2, Article 7.3 of the Code of Virginia titled “Siting of Solar Energy Facilities”, Applicant and the County may enter into a siting agreement (“Siting Agreement”) for solar facilities in those census tracts which meet the eligibility requirements for designation as a qualified opportunity zone by the U.S. Secretary of the Treasury via his delegation to the Internal Revenue Service;

WHEREAS, the Property is located in census tract number 51181860200 within the County, and is eligible for a designation as an opportunity zone;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Virginia Code § 15.2-2316.6, the Project is eligible for a Siting Agreement;

WHEREAS, after negotiation between the County and the Applicant, the Parties desire to enter into this Agreement to mitigate certain potential impacts of the Project;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Virginia Code § 58.1-2636 the County has not adopted an ordinance assessing a revenue share of up to \$1,400.00 per megawatt, as measured in alternating current (AC) generation capacity of the nameplate capacity of the Solar Facility (“Revenue Share Ordinance”), but may choose to do so at a later date;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Virginia Code § 58.1-3660, if the County adopts the Revenue Share Ordinance, the solar photovoltaic (electric energy) systems associated with the Project, which are considered “certified pollution control equipment;” will be exempt from all state and local taxation pursuant to Article X, Section 6 (d) of the Constitution of Virginia (the “Tax Exemption”);

WHEREAS, until such time as the County adopts a Revenue Share Ordinance, such certified pollution control equipment will be subject to local machinery and tools taxation and exemptions as provided by state law and local ordinances;

WHEREAS, the Applicant has agreed to the payments and financial terms contained herein;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the requirement in Virginia Code § 15.2-2316.8 (B), the County has held a public hearing in accordance with subdivision A of Virginia Code § 15.2-2204 for the purpose of considering this Agreement, after which a majority of a quorum of the members of the Surry County Board of Supervisors (“Board”) approved this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to Chapter 22, Title 15.2, Article 7.3 of the Code of Virginia, intending to be legally bound hereby and in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the County and Applicant do hereby agree as follows:

Article I

Project Features, Conditions and Mitigation

1. CUP Conditions. The Applicant acknowledges and agrees that it is subject to all the terms and conditions contained in any conditional use permit (“CUP”) approved by the Board for the Project. The CUP [approved] by the Board on [insert date] is attached hereto as Schedule B and is hereby incorporated herein. Violation by the Applicant or by any of Applicant’s agents, assigns or successors in interest of any terms and conditions of the CUP or of any other applicable zoning requirements shall constitute a violation of this Agreement.

2. Annual Valuation of Real Property. As a condition precedent to County approval of this Agreement, Applicant agrees to provide County with current copies of any real property lease agreements for the Property associated with the Project. Applicant may redact any information deemed confidential tax information or proprietary/trade secrets. However, for any such leases, Applicant shall, at the minimum, provide the annual lease payment amounts for each parcel being leased for the Project. Thereafter, should the payment terms be amended in any such lease agreements, the Applicant shall forthwith provide such information to the County. Applicant further agrees to include as a condition in any agreements transferring ownership of the Project entered into by Applicant a requirement that any successor in interest shall provide such information to the County.

3. Annual Valuation of Taxable Equipment; Updates. Prior to the Commercial Operation Date, Applicant agrees to provide County with a detailed list of capital equipment, including but not limited to solar photovoltaic equipment proposed to be installed, whether or not it has yet been certified as pollution control equipment by the State Corporation Commission or Virginia Department of Environmental Quality, and lists of all other taxable tangible property. Thereafter, on an annual basis, Applicant shall provide County with any updates to this

information, including but not limited to all new or replacement solar panels and all other equipment. Applicant agrees to provide the County all information it may in the future provide to the Virginia State Corporation Commission for the Commission's use in valuing such property for taxation purposes. In addition, prior to the Commercial Operation Date, Applicant shall provide proof of payment for all components of the Project installed prior to the Commercial Operation Date. Applicant shall further submit proof of payment for any additional or replacement component installed during the life of the Project, proof of which shall be updated annually on or before the anniversary of the Commercial Operation Date, and if no such component is installed in any given year, notice of such shall also be filed with the County on or before the anniversary of the Commercial Operation Date.

4. Decommissioning and Periodic adjustment of Surety Bond. The Parties agree that a surety bond to cover the costs of decommissioning Applicant's facilities is required as a condition in the CUP. Further, the Applicant recognizes the protection this provides for the County taxpayers and does not desire to shift that expense to them should the Applicant or its successors or the landowner not be able to comply with the decommissioning requirements; and County recognizes that the surety bond is an expense to be incurred by the Applicant encumbering funds that could otherwise go directly towards investing in the Project or other potential projects. In recognition of these factors, the Parties desire for the bond and the costs for such to accurately reflect the associated decommissioning costs being insured. Therefore, the Applicant, or its successor, agrees to update the gross estimated costs of decommissioning every five years and to reimburse the County for an independent review and analysis by a licensed engineer. The bond or surety amount shall be adjusted accordingly to ensure it accurately reflects the costs associated with decommissioning.

5. Right of Entry for Enforcement and Decommissioning.

- a. **Enforcement.** Applicant shall execute an instrument satisfactory to the County Attorney that runs with and encumbers all parcels related to the Project until such time as terminated by the County (or the Project terminates, whichever comes first) and that provides the County, its personnel and duly authorized agents the express right of entry upon the Project parcels for the purposes of inspecting solar panels and all appurtenant facilities. The County shall provide forty-eight (48) hour notice to the Applicant prior to making such entry for any inspection or enforcement purposes. No prior notice shall be required to enter the Project in the event of an emergency that constitutes an immediate danger to life or property.
- b. **Decommissioning.** If the Applicant fails to decommission the Project, the County shall have unrestricted access to the Project to effect any and all tasks, as necessary, to decommission solar panels and all appurtenant facilities and restore the parcels to substantially the same condition that existed prior to construction of the solar facilities and as provided by Virginia Code § 15.2-2241.2, as it may be amended through the Termination Date as defined in this Agreement. Such access rights shall remain in effect through decommissioning regardless of whether Virginia

Code § 15.2-2241.2 is repealed or otherwise limited in scope from the access rights it provides the County as of the date of execution of this Agreement.

Article II

1. Payment Structure, Capital Payments.

- a. After the Project has obtained Commercial Operation, except as otherwise provided herein, the Applicant shall make payments to the County as set forth on Schedule A attached hereto (each a “Payment” and collectively, the “Payments”). The Payments shall begin one month following the commencement of Commercial Operation of the Project, the “Commercial Operation Date”. The Payments shall continue on or before December 31 of each year thereafter until the earlier of the following (the “Termination Date”): (i) the Applicant’s commencement of the decommissioning of all or a material portion of the Project, (ii) the cessation of operation of the Project for a continuous period of longer than one (1) year, or (iii) the 35th calendar year of commercial electricity generation of the Project in which the final payment on Schedule A is shown. The Parties acknowledge that the Applicant’s obligation to make Payments shall be conditioned upon the Project beginning Commercial Operation. The Payments shall be made to the County in any year in one lump sum payment during the term of this Agreement. The Payments are separate and distinct from the amounts owed pursuant to any machinery and tools taxes on equipment pursuant to Article 2, Chapters 35 and 36 of Title 58.1 of the Code of Virginia and applicable County Ordinances, and all real estate taxes owed pursuant to the Surry County Code of Ordinances. As used herein, “Commercial Operation” shall mean the date the Applicant commences the sale of electricity generated from the Project.
- b. In addition to the foregoing Payments, the Applicant shall pay the County an additional lump sum payment of \$500,000 (the “Additional Payment”) if the Project receives CUP approval on or before April 1, 2021. The Additional Payment shall be made within thirty days of the CUP approval. Following CUP approval, the County will endeavor to expedite site plan approval, provided that if the County refers the plan to a qualified consultant for review and comment, the Applicant shall reimburse the County for such consultant’s fees. Terms and conditions for payment of this referral shall be determined in advance of the referral with the Applicant.

2. Statutory Structure of Payments; Statement of Benefit. The Applicant agrees that by entering into this Agreement, pursuant to Virginia Code § 15.2-2316.6 *et seq.*, the Payments and the Additional Payment are authorized by statute and acknowledges, it is bound by law to make the Payments and the Additional Payment in accordance with this Agreement. The Parties acknowledge that this Agreement is fair and mutually beneficial to them both. As of the date of this Agreement, the County has not adopted a Revenue Share Ordinance as provided under Virginia Code § 58.1-3660 (D), and the Payments under this agreement are not conditioned upon the County adopting such ordinance. Should the County at a later date adopt a Revenue Share

Ordinance, the County acknowledges that it shall not apply to this Project unless and until the County and the Applicant should mutually agree to modify this Agreement. The Parties agree that the funding provided pursuant to this Agreement is beneficial in that it will result in mutually acceptable, steady, predictable, accurate and reasonable payments to the County. Applicant acknowledges that this Agreement is beneficial to Applicant in allowing it to proceed with the installation of the Project with clear project design terms, which provide for mitigation of effects on the surrounding properties and the County community. Additionally, Applicant acknowledges that this Agreement provides for a clear and predictable stream of future payments to the County in values fair to both Parties.

3. Use of Payments by the County. The County plans to apply the Payments and the Additional Payments to critical infrastructure projects to improve citizen quality of life. All payments may be used, at the Board's discretion, for any or all of the following purposes: (a) to fund the capital improvement program (CIP) of the County (b) to meet needs of the current fiscal budget of the County, (c) supplement or establish any fund for which the County maintains a balance policy; or (d) support broadband funding, all as permitted § 15.2-2316.7.

4. Conformance with Comprehensive Plan. Upon approval of this Agreement by the Board, the Solar Facility shall be deemed to be “substantially in accord” with the “Surry County Comprehensive Plan”, in all respects. No further finding shall be required by the County Planning Commission pursuant to Virginia Code § 15.2-2232(A).

5. Effect of Agreement

- a. In accordance with Virginia Code § 15.2-2316.9(B), and as acknowledged and agreed to by the Parties, the terms of this Agreement shall control over any County ordinance(s) and/or regulation(s) that may be inconsistent with the terms of this Agreement. However, nothing shall be construed to exempt the Applicant from any applicable requirement to obtain approves and permits under federal, state, or local ordinances and regulations.
- b. In accordance with Virginia Code § 15.2-2316.8(A)(3), and acknowledged and agreed to by the Parties, this Agreement shall be binding upon the County, the Board, and enforceable against the Board and future governing bodies of the County in any court of competent jurisdiction.
- c. This Agreement is expressly conditioned upon the Board's approval of a CUP authorizing the use of the Property as a utility-scale solar facility pursuant to Section 4.13 of the County Solar Energy Ordinance on terms acceptable to the Applicant.

Article III

Miscellaneous Terms

1. Term; Termination. This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall continue until the Termination Date. The Applicant shall have no obligation to make Payments after the Termination Date. The Payment due for the year in which the Termination Date occurs shall be prorated as of the Termination Date. The termination of this Agreement shall not limit the Applicant's legal obligation to pay local taxes in accordance with applicable law at such time and for such period as the Project remains in operation.

2. Mutual Covenants. The Applicant covenants to the County that it will pay the County the amounts due hereunder when due in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, and will not seek to invalidate this Agreement, or otherwise take a position adverse to the purpose or validity of this Agreement. So long as Applicant is not in breach of this Agreement during its term, the County covenants to the Applicant that it will not seek to invalidate this Agreement or otherwise take a position adverse to the purpose or validity of this Agreement.

3. No Obligation to Develop. The Applicant has no obligation to develop the Project and this Agreement does not require any Payments until after the Commercial Operation Date. Any test energy or other energy produced prior to the Commercial Operation date shall not trigger payment under this Agreement. It is understood that development of the Project by Applicant is contingent upon a number of factors including, but not limited to, regulatory approvals, availability and cost of equipment and financing, and demand for renewable energy and renewable energy credits. No election by the Applicant to terminate, defer, suspend or modify plans to develop the Project shall be deemed a default of Applicant under this Agreement.

4. Successors and Assigns. This Agreement will be binding upon the successors and assigns of the Applicant, and the obligations created hereunder shall be covenants running with the Property upon which the Project is developed. If Applicant sells, transfers, leases or assigns all or substantially all of its interest in the Project, this Agreement will automatically be assumed by and be binding on the purchaser, transferee or assignee. Upon such assumption, the sale, transfer, lease or assignment shall relieve the Applicant of all obligations and liabilities under this Agreement accruing from and after the date of sale or transfer, and the purchaser or transferee shall automatically become responsible under this Agreement. The Applicant shall execute such documentation as reasonably requested by the County to memorialize the assignment and assumption by the purchaser or transferee.

5. Memorandum of Agreement. A memorandum of this Agreement, in a form acceptable to the County Attorney, shall be recorded in the land records of the Clerk's Office of the Circuit Court of the County of Surry, Virginia. Such recordation shall be at the Applicant's sole cost and expense and shall occur as soon as reasonably practicable after the full execution of this Agreement. If the Applicant chooses to not develop the Project, in its sole discretion, the County shall execute a release of the memorandum filed in the aforementioned Clerk's Office.

6. Notices. Except as otherwise provided herein, all notices required to be given or authorized to be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be delivered or sent by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, by recognized overnight courier, or by commercial messenger to:

7. Governing Law; Jurisdiction; Venue. THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE GOVERNED BY AND CONSTRUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA, WITHOUT REGARD TO ANY OF ITS PRINCIPLES OF CONFLICTS OF LAWS OR OTHER LAWS WHICH WOULD RESULT IN THE APPLICATION OF THE LAWS OF ANOTHER JURISDICTION. THE PARTIES HERETO (A) AGREE THAT ANY SUIT, ACTION OR OTHER LEGAL PROCEEDING, AS BETWEEN

Surry County— Cavalier Solar A, LLC
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THE PARTIES HERETO, ARISING OUT OF OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE BROUGHT AND TRIED ONLY IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF SURRY COUNTY, VIRGINIA, (B) CONSENT TO THE JURISDICTION OF SUCH COURT IN ANY SUCH SUIT, ACTION OR PROCEEDING, AND (C) WAIVE ANY OBJECTION WHICH ANY OF THEM MAY HAVE TO THE LAYING OF VENUE OR ANY SUCH SUIT, ACTION, OR PROCEEDING IN SUCH COURT AND ANY CLAIM THAT ANY SUCH SUIT, ACTION, OR PROCEEDING HAS BEEN BROUGHT IN AN INCONVENIENT FORUM. THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE THAT A FINAL JUDGMENT IN ANY SUCH SUIT, ACTION, OR PROCEEDING SHALL BE CONCLUSIVE AND MAY BE ENFORCED IN OTHER JURISDICTIONS BY SUIT ON THE JUDGMENT OR IN ANY OTHER MANNER PROVIDED BY LAW.

8. Confidentiality; This Agreement, once placed on the docket for consideration by the Board, is a public document, subject to production under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (“FOIA”). The County understands and acknowledges the Applicant, and as applicable, its associates, contractors, partners and affiliates utilize confidential and proprietary “state-of-the-art” information and data in their operations (“Confidential Information”), and that disclosure of any information, including, but not limited to, disclosures of technical, financial or other information concerning the Applicant or any affiliated entity could result in substantial harm to them and could thereby have a significant detrimental impact on their employees and also upon the County. The County acknowledges that during the development of this Agreement, certain Confidential Information may be shared with the County by the Applicant. Applicant agrees to clearly identify any information it deems to be Confidential Information and not subject to mandatory disclosure under the FOIA or other applicable law as Confidential Information at the time it provides such information to the County. The County agrees that, except as required by law and pursuant to the County’s police powers, neither the County nor any employee, agent or contractor of the County will (i) knowingly or intentionally disclose or otherwise divulge any such confidential or proprietary information to any person, firm, governmental body or agency, or any other entity unless the request for Confidential Information is made under a provision of Local, State or Federal law. Upon receipt of such request but before transmitting any documents or information which may contain Confidential Information, the County will contact Applicant to review the request for information and associated documents to determine if any Confidential Information is at risk of disclosure. If Confidential Information exists, Applicant may intervene on behalf of the County and defend against disclosure of the Confidential Information. The County agrees to cooperate in this defense and to the extent allowed by law, work to protect the Confidential Information of the Applicant.

9. Severability; Invalidity Clause. Any provision of this Agreement that conflicts with applicable law or is held to be void or unenforceable shall be ineffective to the extent of such conflict, voidness or unenforceability without invalidating the remaining provisions hereof, which remaining provisions shall be enforceable to the fullest extent permitted under applicable law. If, for any reason, including a change in applicable law, it is ever determined by any court or governmental authority of competent jurisdiction that this Agreement is invalid then the Parties shall, subject to any necessary County meeting vote or procedures, undertake reasonable efforts to amend and or reauthorize this Agreement so as to render the invalid provisions herein lawful, valid

and enforceable. If the Parties are unable to do so, this Agreement shall terminate as of the date of such determination of invalidity, and the Property and the Project will thereafter be assessed and taxed as though this Agreement did not exist. The Parties will cooperate with each other and use reasonable efforts to defend against and contest any challenge to this Agreement by a third party.

10. Entire Agreement. This Agreement and any schedules or exhibits constitute the entire agreement and supersedes all other prior agreements and understandings, both written and oral, between the Parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof. No provision of this Agreement can be modified, altered or amended except in a writing executed by all Parties hereto.

11. Construction. This Agreement was drafted with input by the County and the Applicant, and no presumption shall exist against any Party.

12. Force Majeure. Neither Party will be liable for any failure or delay in performing an obligation under this Agreement that is due to any of the following causes, to the extent beyond its reasonable control: acts of God, accident, riots, war, terrorist act, epidemic, pandemic, quarantine, civil commotion, breakdown of communication facilities, breakdown of web host, breakdown of internet service provider, natural catastrophes, governmental acts or omissions, changes in laws or regulations, national strikes, fire, explosion, generalized lack of availability of raw materials or energy. For the avoidance of doubt, Force Majeure shall not include (a) financial distress nor the inability of either party to make a profit or avoid a financial loss, (b) changes in market prices or conditions, or (c) a party's financial inability to perform its obligations hereunder.

13. Third Party Beneficiaries. This Agreement is solely for the benefit of the Parties hereto and their respective successors and permitted assigns, and no other person shall have any right, benefit, priority or interest in, under or because of the existence of, this Agreement.

14. Counterparts; Electronic Signatures. This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument. A signed copy of this Agreement delivered by facsimile, e-mail/PDF or other means of electronic transmission shall be deemed to have the same legal effect as delivery of an original signed copy of this Agreement.

Notice is hereby given that the Surry County Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing on Thursday, April 1, 2021 at 7:00 p.m.

A copy of the Comprehensive Plan Map Amendment, Rezoning, Substantially in Accord and Conditional Use Permit Application, and the Facility Siting Agreement, along with supporting documentation are available on the County's website at www.surrycountyva.gov/AgendaCenter/. Instructions to access the meeting and make public comment is below.

General Project Description: The Applicant proposes to construct a 240 megawatt (MW) solar energy facility to be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight County. The portion of the Project proposed within Surry County would consist of approximately 193 MW of the solar energy facility within 24 parcels with an estimated total of 4,328 acres. Of the 4,328 acres in Surry County, approximately 3,314 acres would be purchased or leased for the Project (Project Area), and the Project facilities would cover approximately 1,341 acres of land (Project Site). The Project will utilize photovoltaic (PV) modules installed on single-axis trackers. Electricity will be delivered from electrical inverters adjacent to the PV modules, via transmission lines that will run from the Project to the nearby Septa Substation owned by Dominion Energy.

Comprehensive Plan Map Amendment No. 2021-01
The Applicant, Cavalier Solar A, LLC, seeks a map amendment to the Development Plan Map of the Surry County Comprehensive Plan to reflect that the property is suitable for General Industrial use. The project consists of 24 parcels which are zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight.

Rezoning Application No. 2021-01

The Applicant, Cavalier Solar A, LLC, seeks to rezone +4,328 acres from Agricultural Rural District (A-R) to General Industrial District (M-1) to permit a solar utility use. The project consists of 24 parcels which are zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight County.

Conditional Use Permit No. 2021-01

The Applicant, Cavalier Solar A, LLC, seeks a conditional use permit for a solar generation facility in Surry County. The project consists of 24 parcels which are zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight County.

The proposed CUP includes conditions to mitigate any adverse effects of the proposed

facility to the affected parcels and immediately adjacent parcels as well as facility decommissioning.

Substantially in Accord Determination

Pursuant to Virginia Code Section 15.2-2232(A), Applicant Cavalier Solar A, LLC seeks a determination that the Project, as defined in Conditional Use Permit Application No. 2020-04, is substantially in accord with the Surry County Comprehensive Plan for the proposal to construct and operate a solar energy facility. The project consists of 24 parcels which are currently zoned A-R, Agricultural Rural District, and will be located in southern Surry County, southeast of Dendron and northern Isle of Wight County.

Facility Siting Agreement

Pursuant to Chapter 802 of the 2000 Acts of Assembly (Va. Code Sections 15.2- 2316.6 et seq.), the Surry County Board of Supervisors will hear public comments and consider the terms and conditions of the siting agreement related to the Cavalier Solar Project to be developed on parcels designated as 53-3B, 53-3F, 53-4, 53-5, 53-6, 59-31, 60-1-1, 60-12, 60-17, 60-20, 60-21, 60-9, 61-1, 61-1-4, 61-1-5, 61-2, 61-2-1, 61-2-2, 61-2-3, 61-2-4, 61-2-5, 61-3, 61-4, 61-5, whereby the Applicant intends to develop, install, build, and operate a utility scale energy facility. The siting agreement includes terms and conditions to mitigate the impacts of the facility, including financial contributions to address capital needs of the County.

The siting agreement may include terms and conditions, including (i) mitigation of any impacts of such solar facility, (ii) financial compensation to the host locality to address capital needs set out in the (a) capital improvement plan adopted by the host locality, (b) current fiscal budget of the host locality, or (c) fiscal fund balance policy adopted by the host locality; or (iii) assistance by the applicant in the deployment of broadband, as defined in §56-585.1:9, in such locality.
