Good evening Mr Chairman and Members of the Board.

My name is Albert Burckard. I'm from Isle of Wight County.

I thank you for allowing one of your "next door neighbors" to address you on this important subject.

To establish by credibility with you, I'm the person who donated some cannonballs to you a few years ago to complete the stacks out front. I have a love and devotion to Surry County history as I do my own county, Isle of Wight.

We in Isle of Wight County are, of course, facing the same dilemma as yourselves.

What is to be the future of YOUR Confederate memorial honoring the sacrifices of past members of your community who died in a cause they themselves believed to be right?

And you know, as well as I, that there were also some Black Confederate soldiers among them.

I just want you to know that, despite my living in your next door county, I'm very familiar with your history.

These memorials, statues and names on buildings, etc. honor the sacrifice of members of YOUR community in defense of their values as they, as a community, YOUR community, perceived them to be at the time.

Yes, ladies and gentlemen, whether you agree with it or not, this is Your own past and it must not be erased for some temporal or transitory reasons.

Is it right to dishonor their memory by removing their names and memorials? I think not.

The rally here on June in front at your historic courthouse was not just a “protest” but it was a call for the elimination and destruction of YOUR history. They said so, loudly and often. I was there.

Some member of your community were there too, representing many you and I think did an excellent job of calming the mob, as I call it. Although some disagreed with the intent of this mob, at least they brave enough to face it to protect YOUR history.

I heartily commend your citizens for doing this.

But the fact remains that this “mob” as I call them, many from out of this area – as I’m sure you know - called for the immediate destruction of your county’s historic monument.

I think you were wise in having a visible law enforcement presence there to forestall any disturbance. If you had NOT taken this precaution, I’m convinced the outcome of this protest may have turned out similar to the violence has occurred elsewhere, as in Portsmouth. These protesters used the same words, had same passion and the same intent. I saw and heard them. I was there.

I commend you for your decision to protect your historic monument.

So my message to you, my earnest plea to each of you, is make sure YOU yourself, each of you, are convinced of the rightness of whatever course of action you choose. Do you really want to erase your history?

This is your own community and your own individual decision as Board members. Search your own conscience and be fair not only to your own selves but to future generations who may wonder why you may choose to erase SOME part of your history but not other parts.

Do not give in to the unthinking and perhaps passionate “mob” of the moment. Mobs do not love, they only hate.

The many name changes to honor recent notable heroes and others may NOT be so popular in days to come. If you remove some of your history, you set a VERY dangerous precedent to have other history also erased.

The whims of the moment are not necessarily the path to future peace among all current and future citizens of Surry County.

Dear Council Members,

I visit the Surry Confederate Memorial many times every year and have done so with many friends each year. In fact I am the one who places the wreath at Christmas time in remembrance of these men.

Do you know Surry has a very unique Memorial to it's County's dead soldiers.

A memorial that took years of dedicated fund raising by wives, mothers, sisters to be finished in remembrance of the dead soldiers of Surry who never made it home to be buried nearby for the families to grieve and have a sense of closure.

Brothers, Sons, Fathers and Husbands left unburied in the haste of the changing ebb and flow of battle.

Perhaps maybe dragged into a quickly dug mass burial ditch. Or those who died of exposure, disease or starvation in a prisoner of war camp such as Point Lookout and dumped into a large pit with thousands who died at such places.

Why is Surry's special ? Many Memorials have a Confederate Infantryman on the top but Surry is the only one of the many I have visited with a Cavalryman.

Why ? Because most of the men who enlisted in Surry were members of the 13th Virginia Cavalry. The others were in the Surry Light Artillery. hence the carved cannons carved in the front.

Our Surry Memorial was erected at the Courthouse like many others NOT for intimidation on which is a newly made up narrative by those who wish to eventually remove all American historical monuments, rather this was the place where the men actually came to enlist and their families bid them farewell. Many for the last time. A place where news of the war came to the County and the families gathered to learn of the fate of loved ones.

Is this same area by a Courthouse at Surry and Counties all across the States not also not used for other war memorials ? Of course they are.

The uneducated also now have come up with another claim that they were placed "during Jim Crow" to establish racism. Also a false doctrine. ( the North was placing their own memorials at the very same time)They were placed as a mass tombstone of sorts for all t

he unreturned to be remembered and give that sense of closure for the County then and now.

The South had lost over 300 thousand men in a four year war and its infrastructure was also devastated... besides grieving it was frankly broke.

Ladies memorial groups formed to erect memorials and it took years as they struggled piece by piece year after year.

Honorable Supervisors of Surry County,

As a Surry landowner and tax payer, I write to ask you to consider carefully your vote regarding moving the monument and how we will chose to preserve Surry history. Any offense taken from the monuments presence comes from misunderstanding of its purpose rather than upon historical fact.

The monument was placed in remembrance of boys from Surry who gave their lives because their County and State called for their sacrifice. It is a monument to Confederate dead. Those Confederate dead, all of whom are ancestors of people in this audience, should not have died in vain.

Neither their sacrifice nor the monument's placement seeks to explain away nor condone the evil institution of slavery and its oppression. Any present-day offense taken from this historical marker's presence ignores these facts.

Following is the last paragraph of a lengthy letter penned by General Peay, Superintendent of VMI, regarding the Institute's recent decision to leave its Confederate History in place:

“As an institution that was founded in the early 1800’s there are obvious historical elements that we cannot change. Today, we make the best decision we can, trusting that the future generations will be equally respectful of our attempts to do the right and courageous things. I am not a Surry County resident but I have a deceased family member that was one of the soldiers your Confederate monument was erected to remember. This situation is no different than if I had a family graveyard in Surry County and moved to another locality, I would still have an interest in maintaining that graveyard. I live in Isle of Wight County, so I regularly visit and spend money in Surry County and will continue to do so, until the Monument is removed.

I know that you have previously heard much about the history of the monument and the soldiers it was erected to remember. I also am fully aware that your decision has already been made to remove the monument and this Public Hearing is only to comply with the

law. I still feel compelled to offer the following facts to you that dispel the most popular false politically correct cancel culture myths.

One myth is that at the start of the Civil War, all of the white male citizens flocked to recruiting stations to volunteer to fight for the Confederacy. The Confederate Government instituted the first drafts in that war, April 26, 1862, September 27, 1862 and February 17, 1864. By the time of the third draft they covered all white men 17 to 50 years old. Obviously if so many had volunteered they would have needed no drafts, much less three. In Surry County these drafts were enforced by the local governing body. These men were your predecessors. Many of the soldiers the monument was erected to remember were drafted and forced to go. Dear Honorable Judge, Board of Supervisors, Dear Administrator,

I hope you are well. I think it makes sense to address the letter to all of you, since it is a general matter. I'm writing because as elected officials you have the duty and power to serve the interests of the community. I'm writing to you as a regular citizen, who thinks about how policy affects our lives and how we engage with each other, not as a Republican or democrat.

The reason for my email is the Confederate Monument in front of the county courthouse. Monuments, statues, schools, seals, and even road names celebrate people, and put them on a pedestal (sometimes literally). The Confederacy was many things, and Southern history is a proud one. But the Confederacy also fought to preserve the enslaving of Americans, and the oppression and murdering of many African-Americans. I believe these actions do not reflect the values of the community, and are deeply hurtful to decent people everywhere. It is also important to remember that many Confederate monuments and names were dedicated in the first half of the 1900s during the Lost Cause movement. Many of these monuments were erected because people wanted to reframe history and try to remember the Civil War as a valiant effort to defend state's rights. In reality, of course, the Civil War was fought to preserve slavery. For those whose ancestors were enslaved, these are symbols of oppression. By placing them on courthouse lawns, or naming schools or roads after them, we continue to give them moral legitimacy.

We should remember our heritage in the right way, and find ways to celebrate the parts of it that are beautiful - brotherhood, courage, sacrifice, valor, among others - while making it clear that the Confederacy also stood for evil that we need to remember, as to not repeat it. Monuments gloss over the nuances. They idolize confederate leaders while whitewashing the full picture of their roles and deeds. You wouldn't be able to tell from looking at a soldier or general high up on a stone foundation.

If we want to remember this part of Southern history, we should do it in a museum, where people can learn about it while understanding the context of time. Surry County should continue to be a welcoming place for businesses and all people, and I think it is of utmost importance to remove and relocate the monument. If you look at my generation's apps, like Instagram or Tiktok, you'll find that people are lightyears apart from the current reality as it relates to confederate monuments. Once my generation takes control of the political system, as your generation has, and as any generation does, I'm concerned that we won't have the same desire to critically engage with our heritage as your generation does, because you still feel more closely connected to it. So in a way, this is also about using your perspective and influence, to make sure that these monuments go to places where they're used to teach people about the good and the bad (like a museum), and where they can find their final, safe, resting place.
